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ing to the employment of the necessary assistants. I may add that this assistance may be employed for secret work as the necessities of the case call for. In other words, the violator of the law who are outraging the consumers of the community must not be advised of our efforts to obtain convicting evidence."

Suggestions as to the means for securing data on the mounting cost of living have been coming in to Mr. Jones' office from several sources. One county attorney suggests that a form be prepared and a series of questions be asked which might tend to aid in the fight.

It is suggested that each merchant be requested to make a list of purchases, dates of purchases, prices paid, names of firms or persons from whom purchased, prices for which each staple was sold each week during the past few months, together with the dealer's explanation as to the reason for each change in price.

It is thought that if this chart is filled out and there is a uniform raise in price on the part of the middlemen it would be strong evidence against the wholesalers, tending to prove a concerted effort to raise prices.
