Conquering the Gods of Creation on the Miami-Superior Highway



PHOENIX, July 3. — "Further than this ye shall not pass." So decreed the gods of creation when they reared the mighty ramparts centering at Apache Leap and now separating the Arizona towns of Superior and Miami. This range from the approach to Superior appears for all the world like an impregnable wall, a mile in height, and though further investigation reveals a secreted canyon threading its tortuous way up the rugged heights, it does not make more plausible the idea that anyone could conceive of forcing a highway across this jagged, precipitous mass of rock formation thrust up by the ingenious forces when the world was young.

But little did the gods who raised this barrier reckon with the modern engineer to whom all things impossible become possible if they are necessary.

The Atlantic could be spanned by a bridge, and auto tours across its waters might become popular if it were really necessary. When commerce pointed the necessity for connecting the waters of two oceans, the Panama canal was dug, and so in a smaller way, when the development of Arizona demanded that one of the largest mining districts of the state should be connected by direct route with the productive valley of the Salt and the Gila, the highway engineers pulled off their coats, smiled at the perversity of nature, and set to work building the road, that seemed impossible.

Impossible is Done

A little climb of four miles from Superior up Queen Creek canyon would convince most anyone that it just couldn't be done, but just the same forces of the state highway department are doing it. One by one the engineers have overcome the tremendous problems of securing easy grade and a suitable location. Yard by yard with the use of air drill and T. N. T. pack trains and air compressors, mule teams and army trucks, brains and brawn, they are forcing their way around or under or through frowning cliffs which rise a sheer 1,000 feet or more from the bottom of the canyon.

Most Noted in Country

It is this class of construction, the heaviest road construction ever undertaken in Arizona, that has made the Superior-Miami project one of the most noted from an engineering standpoint in the country. One of the novel features is the tunnels, one 240 feet in length and the other 279 feet. The work will be attacked from both ends of each bore, thus providing labor for four separate gangs. This will be done by prison labor, as has all the work on the lower portion of the road.

Before the tunnel work could be started it was necessary to install a huge compressor, and in laying the pipe lines it was necessary in some places to carry them around the cliffs from cables. The work has progressed above the prison camp near Superior to the site of the portal of the first tunnel. To reach this elevation and maintain a grade of not greater than 6 per cent, it was necessary to do about a mile of what the engineer terms development work. This starts at the prison camp where the road swings to the left, and winds backward up the sides of a branch canyon before heading again for its destination. The work between the camp and Superior is well along as gangs are working both ways from the camp.

Model Camp

This camp, by the way, is a model in every respect. It has all the high class equipment necessary for a mining camp. Order, discipline and cleanliness are in evidence on all sides, and these reflect a high measure of credit on F. G. Twitchell, the engineer in charge. Building roads is one thing, building mountain roads is another and building roads with convict labor is still another, requiring quantities which are not possessed by every engineer. Lieutenant Twitchell knows how to do all three and do them well, and his ability in this respect may be traced, perhaps to his training in the 23rd engineers, which saw real service overseas.

The prison camp was established with the idea of tackling the hardest part of the work first. To supplement the work of the prisoners and to rush the road through to completion at the earliest possible date, it was decided to build a light pilot road from the other end. This has been constructed and is in use for the hauling of supplies to a point two miles up the canyon from the prison camp. There under the direction of former Sergeant C. R. Bone, state paid forces are tearing down the sides of mountains, shelling the cliffs and making giant fills in a titanic effort to close the gap of rugged wilderness which separates them from the prison gangs. When this is done the heaviest part of the task will have been accomplished and there will only remain the comparatively easy one of completing the grade between the upper camp and the end of the road out of Miami.

Rivalry Between Squads

Incidentally there has sprung up a spirited rivalry between Bone with his 75 American miners and Twitchell with his prison squads. The race is on to see which crew will first reach the upper tunnel, thereby proving the relative efficiency of paid white labor and prison labor.

The completion of the Superior-Miami highway will afford a direct connection between the three copper districts and the agricultural centers below. This will permit daily truck transportation of fruits and vegetables now shipped by rail via Maricopa, Tucson, Bowie and Safford, a distance equivalent to the width of the state.

This highway will also shorten the auto travel distance between Phoenix and the district by 25 miles, and automobiles will be able to make the journey between the two points in three and a half hours, whereas a day's journey is now required to make the trip via Roosevelt.
