RENEGADE MINISTER IS ARRESTED IN BISBEE FOR BAD CHECK OPERATIONS

BISBEE, July 26.—Henry Umstead, believed to be a Methodist minister in Missouri, was placed in the city jail tonight by Deputy Sheriff Gipson, to be held for Nogales officers, who claim to hold a warrant for his arrest charging issuing of a worthless check several weeks ago. The complaint, according to advices from Nogales, was sworn to by Harold Cohen, proprietor of the Montezuma hotel in Nogales.

Umstead's career in Arizona and along the west coast of Mexico during the last two months has been an interesting one to say the least, if everything he is charged with is true.

Put Up Fine Front. About two months ago, a man giving the name of Umstead was enthusiastically received by Nogales councilmen, members of the chamber of commerce, and it is said, members of the ministerial association of the border city. He posed as the son of a wealthy man, according to Nogales reports, and announced that he was planning to build a replica of an Italian villa at Nogales, construct a big library there and accomplish other things for the good of the city. This man was treated with every courtesy by Nogales residents. He is said to have even gone so far as to engage an architect to draw plans for some of the improvement he spoke of.

Then he vanished. While Nogales was wondering what would become of the library that was never built, a complaint was sworn out charging the affable visitor with having issued a worthless check to the proprietor of the Montezuma hotel. But practically no trace could be found of the visitor.

Was to Preach Sunday. Last week Rev. Henry Umstead, armed with credentials indicating that he was a former Missouri minister, appeared in Bisbee. He had been driven out of Mexico by Yaqui Indians while in missionary work on the west coast, he said, and exhibited a scar on one leg that he said was administered when he was attacked by the Indians. Rev. Umstead made the local Y. M. C. A. his headquarters. He was to have occupied the pulpit of a local church last Sunday morning. Saturday evening he collapsed in the Y. M. C. A. When he revived he said he had not eaten for several days. He was fed and outfitted by friends at the institution. Today, it was said, he was to have started working for a local store.

Tonight, however, Sheriff Joe Hood was advised from Nogales to arrest Umstead and hold him for Nogales officers who would arrive tomorrow to take him in custody. Hood at once telephoned his deputy here, Gipson, who located Umstead at the Y. M. C. A. and placed him under arrest.

CHARGE MAN STOLE SPILSBURY'S AUTO. PRESCOTT, July 23.—A complaint has been filed against Jean Foix by Mrs. P. G. Spilsbury charging him with theft of the Spilsbury's Buick, which it is alleged was stolen from the residence which Spilsbury's are occupying here this summer.

Foix has been arrested at Williams and will be brought back to Prescott to answer the charge. The car was in his possession at the time of his arrest.

DEPUTIES CAPTURE MAN WHO ESCAPED FROM COUNTY JAIL. PHOENIX, July 25.—Shortly after the accidental discharge of a revolver he had carried wounded him in the right foot, deputy sheriffs last night arrested Melvin E. Key, who escaped from the county road gang last March after serving about ten days of a sixty-day sentence, imposed on a charge of petty larceny. Key was taken by the officers to the Sisters' hospital, where an operation was to be performed today to remove portion of the bullet from his foot.

LOPEZ IS HELD TO SUPERIOR COURT ON CHARGE OF BURGLARY

BISBEE, July 28.—Medardo Lopez, who last week escaped from Naco, Sonora, and was arrested on the American side of the line, has been held by Judge Jacks, of Douglas, to await the action of the Superior Court on a charge of burglary.

It is claimed that Lopez entered the room of a man named K. Van Staufen in Douglas, taking a quantity of clothing. He was given a hearing in Douglas Wednesday and was held to answer. His bond was fixed at \$1,000.

It is claimed by the Douglas police officers that he has been implicated in a number of burglaries that have occurred in that city during the past few weeks.

HUACHUCA RANCHER HELD ON COMPLAINT OF FORMER SPOUSE. BISBEE, July 28.—Deputy Sheriff Gipson and Constable Walter Shepard went to Moctezuma canyon in the Huachuca yesterday to serve a warrant on W. E. Holt. The warrant was sworn out on a complaint signed by his former wife, Mrs. J. Munroe Johnston, who alleged that he threatened to kill her. Holt was brought back to town and will be given a hearing before Judge Craig during the next few days. He was released on bond.

The officers, on their return, ran into a stream near Soddtown that killed their engine. The water rose up so that it was running into the car. After waiting for some time a car came along and pulled them out of the flood.

NO WORD FROM POSSE IN PURSUIT OF MAN WHO KILLED RANCHER. DOUGLAS, July 28.—No word from the pursuers of Florencia de la Vega, who shot and killed J. A. Campbell, Sonora stockman, in Agua Prieta last Saturday morning, has been received in Agua Prieta during the past 24 hours, and it is believed that they have picked up a trail which led them into wild regions of country where communication with cities is impossible. The latest reports received came from the soldiers guarding the de la Vega ranch 40 miles south of here, who said that the murderer had not been seen in that section for more than two weeks. The information was furnished them by friends of de la Vega and is not taken seriously by the officers conducting the pursuit.

POSTMASTER GENERAL MAY VISIT PHOENIX. PHOENIX, July 25.—Postmaster General Hubert Work or some member of his immediate staff will come to Phoenix to attend the statewide conference of postmasters and postal employees March 16, according to information received today by Postmaster S. J. Michelson.

TEXAN RELEASED. GLOBE, Ariz., July 25.—J. D. Whitten, held here on a warrant from Angleton, Tex., charging murder in connection with the killing of a supposed Ku Klux Klansman in Texas, was liberated today following failure of Texas authorities to reply to telegrams sent by the local sheriff and inquiring whether they wished the prisoner detained longer. Whitten was arrested July 13.
