VERNON VAUGHN MADE CHAIRMAN OF DEMOCRATS

PHOENIX, Sept. 27.—The Democratic state committee including delegates from the fourteen counties were called to order at noon at the state capitol and it was nearly 10 o'clock before the fight over the chairmanship of the committee had been settled.

In addition to these officers four vice chairmen, three of them women, were elected. They are:

TROOPS ORDERED BACK.

NOGALES, Sept. 27.—The first battalion of the Twenty-fifth United States Infantry, comprising 250 officers and men, were stopped two miles out of Nogales today after they had begun the march to Camp Harry J.

NEW MEXICO ASKS ARIZONA TO LIFE STOCK QUARANTINE

PHOENIX, Sept. 25.—It is expected that a definite answer will be given today by state officials to the request made Saturday to Governor Campbell by Governor Mechem of New Mexico, asking that the scabbies quarantine maintained by this state against the importation of cattle from New Mexico be lifted in order to permit stockmen in that state to ship cattle to the ranges of Arizona.

In the message which was received in the governor's office Saturday morning, Governor Mechem stated that, on account of the shortage of feed and the lack of water on the New Mexico ranges, large numbers of the range cattle are dying, and unless the Arizona officials raise the quarantine and permit New Mexico stockmen to ship their stock to the Arizona ranges, the cattle industry in that state will suffer an enormous loss.

Ed W. Stephens, secretary of the livestock sanitary board, in addition to asking the members of the board for their decision as to the lifting of the quarantine, also sent a telegram to Governor Mechem asking for a more detailed statement as to the number of cattle the New Mexico stockmen desire to ship to Arizona; from what sections of that state the animals were to be shipped, and to what ranges in Arizona.

Several days ago, Mr. Stephens said, several gentlemen in New Mexico appealed to the livestock sanitary board asking for a permit to ship their stock to the Arizona ranges on account of the drought in that state, and asking the board to do something in their behalf.

Dr. R. J. Hight, state veterinarian, declared on Saturday that if the lifted, it would not be advisable to permit the importation of cattle to this state from New Mexico points without first dipping them in a solution to eradicate scabbies.

At present, Dr. Hight said, a large area in Navajo county is under a strict quarantine on account of the scabbies and only within the past month have the cattlemen in that district been able to dip the animals on account of lack of feed.

COLLECTOR TRANSFERRED.

NOGALES, Ariz., Sept. 27.—Carlos Diaz, collector of customs in Nogales, Sonora, has left for Mexico City pursuant to orders from the Oregon administration. It is reported in official circles across the border that Diaz is to be made collector of customs at Vera Cruz and that Alejo Pey, the present collector at Vera Cruz, will be transferred to Nogales, Sonora.

TWO MEN KILLED BY LIGHTNING AT CLIFTON

CLIFTON, Sept. 27.—Sheriff Grady and Deputy McAllister were called to Eagle Creek last week when a report was received at the sheriff's office that the bodies of two dead Mexicans had been found four miles up Eagle Creek from the pump station.

The condition of the bodies indicated that both men had been dead about five days. The two dead bodies were identified as those of Romulo Sanchez and Jesus Morono, both well known in Morenci, aged between forty-five and fifty years, the latter being a relative of Paul Backer by marriage.

DRILLING IS PROGRESSING AT ELGIN OIL FIELD

NOGALES, Sept. 27.—Officers and directors of the Nogales Oil and Gas company are highly elated at the drilling progress being made at the Elgin oil field.

Captain L. W. Mix, president of the company, said yesterday that on Friday at noon the depth of the well was 440 feet, the drill having been sunk at the rate of 25 feet a day for four days preceding Friday.

The drill passed through the conglomerate at 405 feet into red shale and since that time the shale has been alternating with hardshell. The layers of shale are from 6 inches to one foot in thickness and the layers of hardshell are from one to four feet in thickness.

TO TRY JONES ON INDICTMENTS BY THE GRAND JURY

PHOENIX, Sept. 27.—Judge E. C. Stafford in superior court yesterday overruled demurrers to two grand jury indictments against Kolin P. Jones, charged with aggravated assault and attempt to commit a serious offense, will be tried on one of the indictments today or tomorrow.

He was embroiled in the Ku Klux Klan investigation last June, appearing as one of the principal witnesses for the state. His testimony at that time was that he was abducted by a band of men last spring, taken to an isolated section and there attacked and maltreated.

The demurrers sought to prove to the court that both of the indictments against Jones were lacking in sufficiency of facts and that no offense, public or otherwise, was committed by the defendant.

CO-DEFENDANT IN MURDER TRIAL TO PRESENT AN ALIBI

PRESCOTT, Ariz., Sept. 25.—Thos. W. Burge, charged with being an accomplice of William E. Acker in the murder of Iver Engle near here last June 11, will endeavor to prove an alibi, it was revealed today when his attorneys sought and obtained a continuance of his trial from today until the next jury session of the superior court.

GOV. CAMPBELL MAKES WEEK PREVENTION WEEK

PHOENIX, Sept. 28.—Gov. Thomas E. Campbell has issued the following proclamation designating October 29 as Fire Prevention week:

"Year by year, the national destruction of life and property by fire has been mounting until the total annual loss of material wealth now approximates the enormous sum of \$485,000,000. This means the wiping out of needed resources at the rate of about \$1,370,000 a day, in addition to the destruction of 48 lives daily.

"In our own state, during the five years ended with 1920, our fire waste came to the great total of \$5,603,184, a sum that would build one thousand homes costing five thousand dollars each, or many miles of good roads. Thus it is evidence that we have been paying our full share of the tax levied by carelessness and ignorance in handling fire hazards.

"Since most fires are preventable, the regrettable devastation by burning takes place day after day is largely unnecessary. It goes without saying that every effort should be made to relieve the people of the self-imposed burden represented by preventable fire.

"Now, therefore, I, Thomas E. Campbell, governor of the state of Arizona, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby designate and proclaim the period from October 29 to 9, 1922, as 'Fire Prevention Week,' and I earnestly request that the proper city departments, cooperating with chambers of commerce and other civic organizations, arrange interesting and educational exercises that will impress the importance of the occasion upon the public mind.

"My sincere hope that all the residents of Arizona will actively take part in this observance through removal of rubbish, litter and other hazards about their homes and places of business; that they will inaugurate the personal habit of carefulness. It is also requested that the churches by means of sermons, addresses, and the press, through editorial mention, shall help to spread the doctrine of watchfulness, and that our schools shall provide systematic instruction in fire prevention to the end that the various communities of the state of Arizona may be made safer and better places in which to live.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state to be affixed. Done at Phoenix, the capital, this 13th day of September, 1922.

ALEX. DURWARD, WELL KNOWN HERE, IS DEAD

YUMA, Sept. 27.—Alexander Durward, for 13 years the owner of the Colorado River Lumber company in Yuma, died Wednesday morning at his home in Banning, Calif., according to a message received yesterday from D. A. Innes.

Mr. Durward was born in Scotland, January 11, 1854. He came to the United States at the age of 21 and spent the remainder of his life in the building of the great Southwest.

Durward was well known among the old timers of Tombstone. He came to Cochise county in the early eighties and was engaged in the freighting business. He drove one of the big 18 mule teams into Bisbee, hauling coke and other supplies to the smelters from Benson and later drove from Tombstone to the various mills that were located along the San Pedro river at Charlestown, Grand Central and Contention.

He quit the freighting business and was for a few years connected with the Cochise Hardware and Trading company in Tombstone. He left Tombstone a number of years ago and went to Yuma, where he engaged in the lumber business and then moved to Banning, California, where he was engaged in the lumber business. While in Tombstone he married Mrs. Frank Leslie, who had secured a divorce from Leslie. Leslie was one of the well-known characters of the early days of Tombstone.

Said bonds to be sold at the said time aggregate Nine Thousand Five Hundred (\$9,500) Dollars.
