ORIGINAL PHOENIX TOWNSITE CANDIDATE FOR GOLF LINKS

PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 12.—Golf enthusiasts soon may be teeing off the original townsite of Phoenix, two miles east of the present business district.

The plot of ground on which the city was founded in 1867 by Jack Swilling, of frontier fame, and a band of 147 pioneers, is being considered as a location for an 18-hole golf course and a club house.

Members of the younger set are back of the plan and the laying out of the links is expected to start soon.

Several adobe shacks, unoccupied for years, are the sole relics of Arizona's capital city in its original state.

PEANUT VENDER TAKES OWN LIFE THIS MORNING

BISBEE, Oct. 12.—"Shorty" Harry Ellsworth, who for a number of years has been conducting a peanut and popcorn stand in Lowell near the express office, this morning died from a gunshot wound in the head, believed to have been self inflicted.

HIGHWAY CONTRACT AWARDED BY CALIF.

PHOENIX, Oct. 11.—The Arizona highway department is in receipt of information from Col. Ed. Fletcher of San Diego that on October 5 the State Highway commission of California let a contract for 14 1/2 miles of asphaltic concrete paving, completing the connection of the paving east of Holtville with the plank road across the sand dunes west of Yuma. This 14-mile stretch was one of the worst places of road between Phoenix and Los Angeles and its elimination will be greeted with three rousing cheers by automobile drivers. It is understood that the California Highway commission has requested the bureau of public roads to construct the highway from the eastern end of the plank road to the Colorado river. This portion of the route is within the Indian reservation and can be handled directly by the bureau of public roads upon the request of the California highway commission.

The elimination of these two bad stretches of road, together with the improvement of the road from Phoenix to Yuma, will greatly facilitate travel to the coast this summer.

Arrangements are now being made for the opening meeting of the general election campaign on October 29, when Gov. Thomas Campbell and other state and national candidates will visit Bisbee. The meeting will probably be held in the Lyric theater.

PRESCOTT, Oct. 11.—E. Stacy, 45, victim of a brutal attack at the Felt hotel, when he was severely beaten by thugs and robbed of \$240, was removed to Mercy hospital in a serious condition. Meanwhile three men who have been arrested by sheriff's deputies have been identified by Stacy as his attackers, are in the county jail charged with assault and robbery.

PIMA COUNTY POTATO CROP BREAKS RECORD

TUCSON, Oct. 12.—Pima county's potato crop smashed all records this year, according to a report issued by A. B. Ballantyne, acting director of the state university's extension service.

Thirty-one farmers of the county grew 508,216 pounds of spuds in 1922, the report states.

A larger acreage is expected to be planted to potatoes next year.

LEAVES FOR EAST

GLOBE, Ariz., Oct. 12.—Senator Frank A. Woodward, director of the Iron Cap Mining company, left for Boston to attend a meeting of the board. He will visit his old home, at Bristol, Tenn., and several eastern cities, returning in time to participate in campaign activities for his reelection to the Arizona state senate.

GUGGENHEIM HAD LARGE INTERESTS IN ARIZONA

TUCSON, Oct. 12.—Large interests in mine and smelter property in Arizona were held by Isaac Guggenheim, financier who died in Southampton, England, it has been learned here.

He held interests in the Hayden smelter, Imperial mines at Silverbell, the Arizona Southern railroad and the El Paso smelter. Julius Kruttschnitt, Jr., is the representative of the Guggenheim interests in this area. He states that he deceased has taken no active part recently in the management of these properties.

CARLOAD OF CATTLE FOR FAIR ARRIVED
