

THE REPUBLICAN REVOLT.

The sweeping reverses experienced by the republican party in the late election were due mainly to the gross corruptions of that party. The result was attained by a large percentage of republicans voting the democratic ticket, and the supposition that they voted with the democracy because of a preference for democratic theories and principles is scarcely tenable. DEMAND FOR SILVER CURRENCY.

In face of the facts and figures it will be exceedingly difficult for the mono-metalists to prove their oft-repeated claim that there is likely to be any very great "glut of silver dollars" in the United States treasuries, or to show that the people do not want silver currency. Reports from Washington state that during the week ending November 11, the sum of \$1,032,900 standard silver dollars were put in circulation by the United States mints.

THE SUPREME COURT OF THE REPUBLIC OF MEXICO.

The supreme court of the republic of Mexico has recently decided that stone coal is a mineral and that deposits of this coal can be "denounced in conformity with the mining laws of the country." The test case was brought forward by Mr. Patrick Milmo of the state of Nuevo Leon.

THE PRESOTT MINER.

The Prescott Miner—a misnomer so far as name is concerned, and never fair but always partisan—says: "In the four largest towns in Arizona, viz: Prescott, Tucson, Tombstone and Phenix, the vote at the late election went in favor of the republicans, but the country, which is settled up mostly by people from Missouri, Arkansas and other southern states, overbalanced the large towns and carried the democratic ticket almost triumphantly."
