Mrs. Henry Dudeney, the distinguished English writer, is the author of "The Shoulder Knot," the novel which opens the December Smart Set. Here is a story of real power, of real emotion, of real people. The scenes of the tale are laid in a remote hamlet in rural England, and four characters constitute practically all those who are vitally concerned in the narrative. How dramatically Mrs. Dudeney brings about her unlooked-for climax, need not be told here; she writes in a masterly way, and along lines genuinely new, far from the beaten paths of current fiction. This novel closes another brilliant year of fiction in the Smart Set's history.

Raked Into Can of Caps
 A. A. McKinnie had an experience last Friday which he will not soon forget. He was cleaning up in the vicinity of his tent at Live Oaks with a rake, when that implement struck a can containing 150 giant caps, which had been hidden by Mrs. Emmett Gainer several months ago to prevent the children from playing with them, and had subsequently been forgotten. The force of the explosion drove parts of the caps into Mr. McKinnie's body, and Dr. Wightman removed a small glassful of them from the various parts of his anatomy. He located others with the X Ray. Mr. McKinnie was in Globe yesterday, and it is said that several old time prospectors tried to post location notices on him, mistaking him for a promising copper claim.—Belt.

Death of Mrs. Patterson
 Although nearly everyone in Safford knew that Mrs. Frank T. Patterson was dangerously ill with typhoid fever, the announcement of her death which occurred last Sunday evening came as a great shock to the entire community.

During the summer Mrs. Patterson had taken care of two of her little nephews and her own boy, who had typhoid fever one after another. As soon as the last one was well she was taken with the same disease which lasted about six weeks when death relieved her of her sufferings.

The funeral services were held on Monday at the family residence under the auspices of the Eastern Star, of which she was an honored member. Rev. A. L. Hawley preaching the funeral sermon. The body was interred in the Union cemetery.

Mrs. Patterson has resided in Safford for about three years and had endeared herself to all with whom she became acquainted. She was married to Frank T. Patterson of this place two years ago in August. Besides her husband she leaves a small son. Mrs. Patterson was a young woman, being but 30 years of age. She was a native of Springfield, Ill.

Mr. Patterson has the sincere sympathy of the community in his sad bereavement.

Sees 80-Cent Silver
 "Silver is going to reach a price of 78 or better within two years and it is going to hold that price" said George W. Roberts, director of United States mints. "I believe that hundreds of silver mines throughout the west which have been shut down for more than ten years because of the fall in price will be opening again within a year simply because the price of the metal will make it worth while.

"The price of 71 today will be better next month, and it will steadily and naturally advance point at a time until a high market, near 80, will be touched."

W. O. Tuttle of Rice, stopped off at Safford last Saturday and Sunday on his way to Phoenix. He has gone there to procure from the territorial veterinary medicine to prevent blackleg among his cattle. Mr. Tuttle has just filled his corn contract at Apache, having bought 100,000 pounds in four days. He will complete his hay contract of 1,000,000 pounds by the middle of December. Mr. Tuttle expects to open a trader's store at Apache on January 1st.
