

Flowers Under Glass.

The six states having the greatest areas of glass for floriculture are Illinois, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, New Jersey and Massachusetts. These six states have within their borders 61 per cent of all the glass in the United States. The figures, as given by Dr. Galloway of the bureau of plant industry, are as follows:

Japan chestnuts are proving of but little value at the South Haven experiment station in Michigan. Two of the European varieties, Paragon and Comfort, are very promising and have given several noteworthy crops. In the test of cover crops in the orchard mammoth clover has proved especially valuable. It is most satisfactory when oats or barley is grown with it.
