Mrs. C. F. Solomon returned Sunday from a visit with relatives in Tucson.


Mr. and Mrs. Fred Blake, of Solonville, have a son, born last Thursday, April 17th.

ABRAHAM DIAZ

Abraham Diaz, one of the oldest pioneers of the Gila valley, died very suddenly in Solonville Wednesday and was buried yesterday afternoon.  
 Mr. Diaz was in the Solomon Commercial Co.'s store conversing with Mr. Freudenthal when he complained of being ill, and started for home. He reached the front steps of the store and sat down, when he had a severe hemorrhage of the lungs. Several men went immediately to his assistance, but he was dead before they could get him home.

Mr. Diaz was among the early pioneers of Arizona, having come here in 1874 from San Diego and settled in Tucson. He came to Solonville in 1876 and has lived there ever since. He was married in Clifton to Mrs. Gertrude Johnson in 1885.
