ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE HUNDRED ELEVEN LAND AND CATTLE COMPANY

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, M. R. Kempton, whose residence and postoffice address is Safford, Arizona, N. T. Kempton, whose residence and postoffice address is Safford, Arizona, and W. R. Chambers, whose residence and postoffice address is Safford, Arizona, and all being citizens of the State of Arizona and of the United States of America, have this day associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Arizona, and do make, sign, acknowledge, publish and adopt the following as the Articles of Incorporation thereof:

Article I

The names of the incorporators are M. R. Kempton, N. T. Kempton, and W. R. Chambers. The name of the corporation is Hundred Eleven Land and Cattle Company; the principal place for the transaction of business is the Town of Safford, County of Graham, State of Arizona, and branch offices may be established by the directors at such other places within or without the State of Arizona as they may from time to time determine.

Article II

The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation and which it proposes to promote and carry on, as fully and to all intents and purposes as natural persons might or could do is as follows, to-wit:

- (1). To buy, own, sell, mortgage, exchange, lease, acquire, dispose of, and in every way whatsoever, to deal in and handle cattle, horses, sheep, goats, mules, and all other classes of live stock and personal property.
(2). To buy, own, sell, mortgage, exchange, lease, acquire, dispose of, and in every way whatsoever, to deal in all classes of real estate.
(3). To invest in, take over, buy, sell, pledge and exchange stock, shares, bonds and securities of this corporation, and also all other companies, corporations and persons; to make advances upon, hold in trust, sell or dispose of any of the investments aforesaid; to hold, purchase or otherwise acquire, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds and securities issued or created by other corporations and persons, and while the holder thereof, to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to cause or allow the legal title, estate and interest in any property acquired, established or carried on by the company, to remain or to be vested or registered in the name of, or carried on by, any other company or companies formed, or to be formed, or as agents or nominees of this company, or upon any other terms or conditions which the Board of Directors may consider for the benefit of the company; and to manage the af-

fairs, take over and carry on the business of such company or companies so formed, or to be formed, either by acquiring the shares, stocks or other securities thereof, or otherwise, and to exercise all or any of the powers of holders of shares of stock or securities thereof and to receive and distribute the dividends and interests on such shares, stocks or securities.

To guarantee the payment of dividends or interest on any shares, stocks, debentures, or other securities issued by, or any contract or obligation of any corporation or persons; to remunerate any person, persons or corporation, for services rendered or to be rendered, in placing or assisting to place, the shares of this company's stock, or any debentures or other securities of the company in or about the formation of the company, or conduct of any of its business or affairs.

(4). To issue debentures, bonds, notes and other obligations, and to deal in the same, and to buy, sell and deal in shares of its own capital stock.

(5). To donate or use any of its surplus earnings or accumulated profits or funds, in the purchase or acquisition of its own stock, and such stock may when so purchased, in the discretion of the Board of Directors, be deposited in the treasury of the company, as treasury stock, to be thereafter disposed of as such stock, but it may be held by the corporation as any other property; to issue bonds to any amount authorized by law, and to secure the same by mortgage or deed of trust, and the directors and officers of the company are authorized to make and issue said bonds and said mortgages or deeds of trust.

(6). To hold any meeting or meetings of the stockholders or of the directors at any place within or without the State of Arizona where a branch office may be established by the board of directors.

Article III

The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be \$100,000.00, divided into one hundred shares of one thousand dollars each. It shall be paid at such times as the Board of Directors may designate in cash, real or personal property, services, leases, options to purchase or any other valuable right or thing for the uses and purposes of the corporation, and all shares of capital stock hereof shall be fully paid and thereby become and be fully paid the same as though paid for in cash at par, and shall be non-assessable forever, and in the absence of actual fraud the judgment of the Board of Directors as to the value of any property right, thing or services rendered in exchange for capital stock shall be conclusive.

Article IV

The time of the commencement of the corporation shall be the day these Articles of Incorporation are filed in the offices of the Corporation Commission of the State of Arizona and a certified copy thereof, recorded in the office of the County Recorder of Graham County, State of Arizona; and its termination shall be twenty-five (25) years, thence next ensuing, with the privilege of renewal and the right of perpetual succession now provided by law.

Article V

The affairs of the corporation shall be conducted by a Board of not less than three nor more than five directors, by whom a president and vice-president and secretary and a treasurer shall be elected from among their number. The offices of secretary and treasurer may be combined in one person at the discretion of the Board of Directors. The directors shall be elected from among the stockholders at the annual stockholders' meeting to be held on the second Monday in January of each year. Until their successors are elected and have qualified, the following named persons shall be directors, M. R. Kempton, N. T. Kempton, and W. R. Chambers, of whom W. R. Chambers, a resident of Safford, Arizona, and whose postoffice address is Safford, Arizona, until their successors are elected and have qualified, M. R. Kempton, shall be President, N. T. Kempton, Vice-President, and W. R. Chambers, Secretary and Treasurer.

Article VI

The directors shall adopt by-laws for the governing of the corporation and may amend the same. They shall have the power to fill vacancies appearing in the Board from any cause.
