News Snapshots Of the Week

The return of E. Root and the other members of the American mission to Russia gave us an insight into Russia's strength: Root reported the republic safe if the present government received our whole hearted support. Selecting his new cabinet, Dr. Georg Michaelis, German chancellor, named Dr. von Kuhlmann as foreign minister, while Dr. Karl Helfferich, vice chancellor, was the only one of the old cabinet to remain. Liberals in Germany find no satisfaction in the change. Canadians advanced on Lens, the German stronghold in France; Sir Arthur Currie has now become commander of all the Canadian forces. Part of America's draft army will be in camp by Sept. 1; identification disks will be worn by all our soldiers in the future. Fighting for the possession of her son, Mrs. John L. De Saules, wife of the former Yale football star, shot her husband and is now in jail in Mineola, N. Y.; Mrs. De Saules is a childless widow, and it is claimed millions will be spent for her defense if necessary; she was divorced from De Saules.

Officer Kempton Arrests Two Bootleggers and 21 Cases of Whiskey

The county jail is filling up with bootleggers and incidentally the stock of booze is increasing. The latest guests at the Hotel McBride were brought in early Friday morning by Chief Deputy Kempton, a man and a woman, giving their names as Will Davis and Edna Davis, man and wife.

It seems word had been sent here last Thursday night that a man and a woman in a Studebaker Six, with a cargo of booze, were on their way, and Officers Kempton and Skaggs went out to meet them.

The car not showing up after midnight arrived, the officers returned here and Deputy Kempton started for his home on the Solomonville road.

When near the sandwash, about 4:30 o'clock Friday morning, the officer saw the car coming, so he placed his car across their path and stopped them. They told Kempton they were on their way to Globe from Bisbee.

The officer said he wanted to look over the car, but the man said he lost his key. When the officer insisted he said he was loaded with booze. The officer, who was standing on the running board of the booze car, ordered the man to drive into town and they started off.

When near the turn into the Safford road, the man drove the car across the bridge and started south; as he did so, the officer shoved his gun into the man's face and ordered him to turn around and go north.

About this time, the lady bootlegger got busy trying to get a gun out of the pocket on the door of the car. Officer Kempton got busy with the butt of his gun pounding her hand to prevent her getting the gun, until her hand was bloody and she finally desisted.

The man had driven the car across the bridge and was turning, when John Davidson hove in sight and the officer called him. Davidson took the Winchester and guarded the woman and trouble ceased.

MOBILIZATION OF ARIZONA TROOPS

Will Take Place September 5th, September 19th and October 3d

PROCLAMATION BY GOVERNOR

Calls Upon People In Each County to Celebrate and Wish Them Godspeed

Governor Campbell has issued the following proclamation, calling upon the people in each county of the State to celebrate the mobilization days of the quotas in their county that have been drawn under the selective draft for the National Army:

WHEREAS, The President has ordered that the first quota of thirty per cent of the men drawn under the Selective Service Act, to form the National Army of the United States, will be mobilized on September fifth at each county seat, or other center to be designated by the local boards of the several counties of Arizona; and

WHEREAS, The second thirty per cent will be mobilized on the nineteenth day of September, in like manner, and the third thirty per cent on October third, under the same conditions; and

WHEREAS, The people of Arizona should signify their deepest sense of gratitude and affection for the loyal spirit of these valiant bodies of our young manhood, who offer their lives at their country's altar, to preserve and perpetuate liberty and freedom for all peoples against the demands of an arrogant autocracy;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Thomas E. Campbell, by power in me vested as Governor of Arizona, respectfully urge upon all our people that these days be set apart and celebrated in such a manner as to do them proper honor.

Let us all gather in the places set apart in our respective counties; and, following the example of our patriotic forefathers, wish them Godspeed and demonstrate our ardent hopes and prayers that their mission may be quickly and successfully realized, that Victory may abide with their banners and that Almighty God, in Whom we trust, as a State and Nation, may in His divine providence bring our loved ones home to us again, with all honor and glory.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Arizona to be affixed. Done at Phoenix, the Capital, this 22d day of August, A. D. 1917.
