OBITUARY

Mrs. Lydia Ann Packer, aged 71 years, died October 8, 1918, after a long illness.

Funeral services were held in Layton Chapel, Thursday, October 10, 1918, at 2:00 p. m. Bishop Joseph Greenhalgh officiated.

The Layton choir sang several beautiful anthems appropriate to the occasion.

The speakers were: Bishop Greenhalgh, Louisa Welker, A. E. Jacobson, Fannie Kimball, Selina Phillips and President John F. Nash, all of whom made appropriate remarks regarding the life and integrity of Mrs. Packer.

Mrs. Packer was born November 19, 1847, in upper Canada, Middlesex County, Township of Exford. She came to Arizona September, 1884, with her husband and children, and settled in the Layton Ward, where she has lived ever since.

She was a very active worker in the ward and was elected president of the first Primary Association organized in the Layton Ward. Later on she was called to be first counselor to Elizabeth Layton in the Relief Society. When Mrs. Layton resigned her position, Mrs. Packer was elected president, which office she held for many years. When her health failed, she resigned and went to Los Angeles for medical treatment.

She was again chosen first counselor to Alice K. Beebe, which office she held for eight years.

She leaves five daughters: Mrs. John Warren, of Bisbee; Mrs. George Jacobson, Mrs. Melvin Montieth, of Safford; Mrs. G. L. Freestone and Mrs. M. M. Crandall, of Gilbert, Arizona, and thirty-eight grandchildren and twelve great grandchildren to mourn her loss.

The interment was made in the Union cemetery beside her husband.
