

**WILL REFUND WAR TAX**

She had been in poor health for the past five years and most of the time not able to be around. About two years ago she suffered a stroke of paralysis which developed into stomach trouble and caused her to be an invalid the last year of her life.

Funeral services were held at her home Monday, at 2:00 o'clock p. m.

The speakers were: James A. Duke and A. C. Peterson, who spoke words of praise of the deceased, of her true and noble life as a wife and mother, also words of comfort to the bereaved ones.

Bishop Frank Tyler presided over the services and a select choir sang some beautiful anthems during the services. Closing prayer by W. A. Posey, father of Mrs. Charlson.

The remains were interred in Thatcher cemetery and the grave was dedicated by A. C. Peterson.

Mrs. Hyrum Charlson was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Posey, old pioneers of Thatcher, who still reside there. She was born in Alabama, near Branchville, St. Clair county. She, with her parents, came to the Gila valley and settled in Thatcher at the age of 10 years. She was always a staunch Latter Day Saint and remained faithful to the end.

She married Hyrum Charlson, of Thatcher, at the age of 18 years and nine children were born to them, five boys and four girls, all living except one boy. Two sons are at present in the service of the United States, Rudolph in the navy and Roy in the army. Neither were present at the funeral.

Two daughters are married, Mrs. E. L. Spriggs and Mrs. Sam Sowell, both living in the valley, and two grandchildren.

Mrs. Charlson was a cheerful and hopeful woman, loved by a large circle of friends throughout the valley, who will sadly miss her, besides her husband and children and many relatives.

Charles N. Birdno, aged 55 years, died at Superior, Arizona, Thursday, December 26, 1918, from heart disease.
