TRUTH ABOUT STATEHOOD

Whatever may be claimed by candidates on either side for election to the senate of the United States, regarding the comparative records of Mark Smith and Ralph Cameron, in congress at the time the law giving Arizona Statehood was enacted, the irrefutable truth of the situation may be obtained from the Congressional Record of that period.

The following facts, copied from the Congressional Record and given as authentic and impartial, are submitted to the public, of Arizona:

"Hon. Mark Smith, during his term of service as a delegate from the Territory of Arizona, introduced at different times eight bills providing for the Statehood of Arizona. It was owing to the persistent and well-directed efforts of Senator Smith, as a delegate from the Territory of Arizona, in several congresses, Statehood was finally accomplished.

"The bill which was finally passed giving Arizona Statehood, was introduced by Mr. Hamilton, but was based on a similar bill introduced previously by Delegate Smith. Mr. Cameron introduced one Statehood bill, that of February 16, 1909, based on prior bills, but this was never acted upon by the house committee. Mr. Hamilton was chairman of the Committee on Territories of the House, and Senator William Alden Smith, chairman of the Committee on Territories of the Senate."

Further facts of interest in connection with Arizona Statehood may be gleaned from the following excerpts from speeches published in the Congressional Record:

Tribute of Hon. A. O. Stanley, a colleague of Mr. Smith, in a speech delivered in the House, February 15, 1909, Congressional Record, Vol. 43, page 3420, in part, as follows:

"But a short time ago it seemed morally certain that Arizona and New Mexico would be indissolubly bound in a union that to the people of Arizona appeared nothing less than a loathsome and abhorred miscegenation. Then it was that Mark Smith displayed his tireless devotion to his people and his marvelous tact and resourcefulness in saving the impending catastrophe.

"Delegate without a vote, with nothing to give and nothing to exchange, battling several hundred cool, calculating politicians."

Mr. Chandler, democrat, Congressional Record, Vol. 45, pages 2421 and 2422, member of House Committee on Territories:

"This result has been brought about not only by reason of the fact that the two great parties have declared in favor of it, but because of the further fact, that the distinguished delegate from Arizona, Mr. Smith, had labored in session and out of session for its accomplishment."

Mr. Cole, republican, member of House Committee on Territories:

"A strong impression prevails that this is not the final honor for that gentleman (Mr. Smith), but merely a stepping stone to the senate of the United States."

Mr. Sulzer, democrat: "I indulge the gratifying hope that when these two territories become full-fledged states in the union, our distinguished colleague, Mr. Smith and some other good democrat will be the senators from Arizona."

HEART OF ARTICLE X

THE PROMISE—"The Members of the League undertake to respect, and preserve as against external aggression, the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all Members of the League."

THE PLAN—"In case of any such aggression, or in case of any threat or danger of such aggression, the Council shall advise upon the means by which this obligation shall be fulfilled."

WOMEN DEMAND THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Women, running true to form, are championing the League of Nations because, as usual, they are trusting to their instinct, and instinct tells them that this proposal is the only safeguard to peace.

But by far the most important provision, and of this we hear little, is the proposal to disarm the world. The financial burden which this would lift is enormous. Men fully appreciate that 93 per cent of all federal appropriations are made for war, past, present and future. But to women of America, disarmament does not mean so much a saving in money. It means that by every gun, every battleship,

every piece of fighting machinery we scrap, by so much have we reduced the chances of war, and that is what American women, and women all over the world, want.

American women are at this time more concerned with the sufferings and needs of Europe, the undernourished women and children, than they are with the cry which the republicans are setting up, namely America's superiority in finance, resources and trade, which prestige must be maintained, no matter what the cost in spiritual disintegration.

Shall America go to pieces through greed and selfishness? American women answer "No! and again no!"

LEAGUE A GREAT MORAL ISSUE

The cardinal doctrines of Christian service are set forth in a half-dozen paragraphs of the Covenant.

The League will set up, or itself become, a clearing house for international justice and social service.

Among the things that the nations working together will endeavor to do, all member nations agreeing, are the following:

They will try to secure and maintain fair and humane conditions of labor for men, women and children, thus lifting the standards of living everywhere.

They will try to secure just treatment of the native inhabitants of territories under their control.

They will try to secure and maintain freedom of communications and of transit and equitable treatment for the commerce of members of the League.

They will labor together in the effort to control and ultimately eradicate disease.

They will set up commissions for the prevention of the illicit traffic in arms, in dangerous drugs and in women for immoral purposes.

These practices constitute the endemic centres, or breeding places, of what we may call the disease of civilization. The task of controlling the spread of these evils and in time cleaning up the plague spots is too big to be accomplished by any one nation. It can only be done by international cooperation, and the League supplies the necessary agency.—Governor Cox.

PEACE, PROGRESS AND PROSPERITY

"Next year, if we go into the League of Nations, we can save \$465,000,000 in our Navy alone. Do you know what you can do with \$465,000,000? You can reclaim 23,000,000 acres of arid land in the West. I am in favor of stopping the building of battleships and of reclaiming arid land, and of giving every soldier boy a farm and a home of his own, if he wants to try it out there in that great promising country. If he doesn't want that, then I am in favor of the Fourfold plan, which was recommended by the American Legion at Cleveland within the last week or ten days."—Governor Cox.
