Anthony Selected

W. B. Anthony, former speaker of the house of representatives and one of the most widely known newspaper men of the state, was chosen by the democratic members of the caucus Wednesday night as one of the members of the state capitol building commission. Anthony was elected on the fifth ballot when he defeated Tom Hale of McAlester by a vote of 17 to 10, the necessary caucus majority, and then his selection was made unanimous. His name now goes before both branches of the legislature for ratification, which is considered certain. At the first caucus held Wednesday, twelve candidates were presented on the first ballot with Anthony in the lead. After two hours of balloting all of them were eliminated with the exception of Anthony, W. B. Longmire of Shawnee, former State Senator Williams of Weatherford, Boone Hite of Anadarko and Tom Hale of McAlester. At the night caucus C. F. Colcord of Oklahoma City and H. P. Bowles were added. On the first ballot Anthony received 9 votes Williams 8, Bowles 1, Longmire 3, Colcord 1. 2nd ballot: Anthony 8, Williams 8, Hale 6, Longmire 3, Bowles 1, Colcord 1.

3rd ballot: Anthony 7, Hale 7, Williams 7, Longmire 6. 4th ballot: Anthony 11, Hale 11, Williams 6. 8th ballot: Anthony 17, Hale 10. Mr. Anthony probably is one of the most widely known democrats in the state, having been prominently before the public since statehood. He was a member of the house of representatives of the first, second and third legislatures and was speaker of the house in the special session of the second legislature. He also was private secretary to Governor Haskell, and now is secretary to Lieutenant Governor McAlester and assistant reading clerk of the senate. Mr. Anthony is editor of the Marlow Review.

Mr. Anthony was born in Tennessee, received a university education and was admitted to the bar in Tennessee, soon after he left college.

Wins Another.

Four members of the Krebs Gun Club again demonstrated their ability as marksmen at the shoot last Sunday when they met and defeated four members of the McAlester club—being the second time Krebs has "walloped" the boys from the county seat in the past two weeks. The final score was McAlester 57, Krebs 78.

The Krebs team was composed of Clarence Homer, Frank Hokey, Harry Kiple and Harry Hokey.

Struck Gas At Ashland

The Test Oil company is now erecting their derrick in the northwest quarter of section 30-3-12 a half mile southwest of their large gasser, the fifth well in section 19-3-12. They consider this new location just the right distance from the axis of the antiline and are expecting to bring in a large producer. The Mallory & Brennan test is down 1,950 feet with nothing showing yet, although it is reported that they are going deeper. The Ashland Oil and Gas company has recently let a contract for a test well to be drilled a few miles southwest of here. This well is to begin by July 1.
