

**Cincinnati Trophy to Oseau.**  
 CINCINNATI, June 10.—The feature of the racing at Latonia was the Cincinnati trophy for two-year-olds at five and a half furlongs. The race was won by Oseau in a driving finish by a nose. He beat Fisherman, the pacer-maker, in the very last stride. Seven youngsters started, and they produced an exciting contest throughout. Besides the \$3,130 which went to the winner a silver trophy, presented by Mayor Fleischmann of Cincinnati, was given to the winner's owner, J. J. Groener of Nashville.

**Coup For Posour.**  
 CHICAGO, June 10.—Posour was made the medium of a coup in the first race at Harlem, which she won with ease. Badly beaten by cheap fields in her last two times out, her sudden reversal of form brought about an investigation by the stewards of the Harlem Jockey club, with the result that J. Gray & Co. and their trainer, M. Foster, as well as the horses running in the name of the firm, including Posour, Gus Heldown and others, were suspended pending an investigation.

**New World's Auto Record.**  
 CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 10.—James F. Moran of Chelsea created a new world's record for one hour's riding behind four horsepower machines at Charles River park last night, making the distance of 41 2-5 miles in the hour. There were seven starters in the race, including besides the winner Will C. Sinsou, Sammy Sulkins, Benny Munroe, Basil de Gulchard, Patsy Keegan and Louis Metting. The last named withdrew.

**On Electric Park Track.**  
 BALTIMORE, June 10.—Lillian S. won the 2:17 class trotting race at Electric park in three straight heats. Paul Kruger was second, Marvline third and Hildercroft fourth. Best time, 2:19 1/4. The 2:11 mixed race and the 2:17 pace were unfinished. Dr. Marvin won two heats and John W. Patterson one in the former. Blackbird has two heats credited to him in the pace, while Knox Gelatine has one.

**Beldame's Easy Win.**
