George W. Gibson, traveling passenger and freight agent of the People's line steamers on the Hudson, was in town Thursday on official business.

James Keeler who has been employed here for some time has moved his family to this town from Cohoes and will occupy the Cordes house on Maple street.

On account of the extensive freight traffic on the Chatham division an extra was run to Chatham and return Thursday leaving here at 10 a. m. Besides this a "double header" was run the night before. Three Rutland crews are now employed on this division.

Farm produce is selling at the local stores for the following prices this week: Eggs, strictly fresh, 24 cents a dozen; butter, creamery, 35 cents; farmer's 28 cents; potatoes, 90 cents a bushel. The price of eggs has not changed since Easter when they advanced slightly over the previous quotations.

### POLAND TO BE UNDEFENDED

Russia, Frightened by Austria, to Draw Back Defences.

St. Petersburg, May 7.—The unexpected display of military vigor by Austria-Hungary during the Balkan crisis and the realization of her own weakness since the Russo-Japanese war has led to a far-reaching readjustment of Russia's military policy, which is now engrossing the attention of the members of the general staff. The position of the Russian troops in Poland, which projects nearly 300 miles west of Russia proper, and which is surrounded on three sides by Austrian and German territory, has been found to be too precarious under the new conditions, and it has practically been decided to abandon the extended lines of defence and adopt a new line further to the east, with more powerful fortresses at Kovno and Brest Litovsk.

In case of war the westerly parts of Poland would be abandoned without serious defence and mobilization would be carried on behind the new chain of fortresses. The change involves the abandonment of many advanced fortified positions, which will be dismantled, several of them being destroyed.

The news of the evacuation, which is filtering among the people, has started a fantastic rumor that Russia is about to sell Poland to Germany, and several newspapers have taken the matter up. The change will scarcely be agreeable to France since the presence of a powerful army within striking distance of Berlin was counted upon to relieve the pressure in the direction of France in time of war.

### AMERICANS KILL MEXICANS

Five Men and a Woman Die in Fight at Plantation

Vera Cruz, Mex., May 7.—Harold Sanborn of Chicago, son of President Sanborn of the Junta Plantation company and the Sanborn Lumber company, is in jail, and six Mexicans are dead as the result of a clash between young Sanborn and the owner of the La Tienda Plantation on one side and a number of Mexicans on the other. Vicente Espinosa a prominent cattle man, and one woman are among the dead.

Chicago, May 7.—A letter has been received here by E. A. Allen from his sister, who is the wife of Harold Sanborn, telling of the fight, but giving no details. The letter upholds Sanborn and says that he was in the right.


