CANNON MAY QUIT RACE

Believed to Have Given Up Hope of Being Minority Leader

Washington, March 25.—The election of L. White Busbey to be secretary of the new international joint commission is believed to indicate that Uncle Joe Cannon at last has come to realize that he cannot be the official leader of the minority in the new Congress. Mr. Busbey has been Speaker Cannon's secretary for years. He was recognized as chief pusher behind the movement to elect Uncle Joe minority leader, and a very effective acquaintance with every member of the House.

But recently Uncle Joe walked over to the other side of the House wing from his office and made a call on James A. Tawney, late chairman of the committee on appropriations of the House and most influential member of the international joint commission. When he left Mr. Tawney, Mr. Busbey's selection as secretary of the commission had been agreed upon, and at the same time it is believed the deathknell of the Cannon hopes for minority leadership was rung. In other words Uncle Joe's timid friends who have been trying to show him the inadvisability of trying to become minority leader, finally made an impression upon the old warhorse, whereupon he dashed out and got a good job for his friend Busbey and called off his own campaign in the same breath.

This does not indicate that Mr. Cannon no longer believes he ought to be minority leader. He believes that he is entitled to that "vindication." At the same time his vocabulary remains unimpaired, and his opinions of things as they are will be given hectic expression from time to time as heretofore.

TOOK PLACE IN MANCHESTER

Beartown, Scene of Moffit Tragedy is not Located in Sandgate

Editor of the Banner.—It is with much regret and sorrow that we learn of the death and sad fate of Cyrus Moffit of Sandgate. Mr. Moffit was quite a noted violin player and well known here and well liked for many miles around. He was a good and kind hearted neighbor, often putting himself out of the way to help and to accommodate his fellow men. His friends were many and he was always civil and quiet with a friendly joke for all. The people in this community are thoroughly aroused over his sad fate, they will do all in their power to help capture the assailant of Cyrus Moffit and it is the one hope of all that he will soon be captured and punished to the full extent of the law.

There has been considerable discussion here as to the place and town in which Moffit received his death blow. Some don't even know where Beartown is located. For the benefit of the many readers of The Banner, I wish to say that Old Beartown, so called, is located in the town of Manchester, at the back of Equinox mountain, something like two miles as the crow flies from Manchester village and six miles around the road. Thomas Mears is a resident of Manchester and has lived at Beartown for over 75 years and has a sort of a dance hall where he has had dances more or less for the past 50 years. It was here at a dance that Cyrus Moffit received his death blow.

Moffit was a resident of Sandgate owning and living on the old Jonathan Gale farm and as old Sandgate has had troubles enough of its own in the past, we will say it had nothing to do with this affair whatever as the rumpus took place as before stated in the town of Manchester.
