

## The Right Way to Roll a Cigarette



I. In fingers of left hand, hold cigarette paper curved, so as to receive the tobacco. Pour right quantity of "Bull" Durham out of mullin sack with right hand, stroking tobacco evenly in paper.



II. Then place your two thumbs next to each other in the middle of the paper in this position.





V. Hold the cigarette in your right hand, and




VI. Moisture the projecting edge of the paper.


