TROOPS FOR ARKANSAS

Four Troops of Cavalry to Check Rioting Strikers

Washington, Nov. 3.—President Wilson today ordered United States soldiers to Fort Smith, Ark., to assist United States Judge Frank A. Youmans in enforcing the orders of his court in connection with a mine strike in the Hartford Valley coal region.

Four troops of the Fifth Cavalry, about 250 men, were sent from Fort Sheridan, near Chicago, to act under

the instructions of the court. They will carry machine guns among their equipment. Major Nathaniel F. McClure of the Fifth Cavalry, who has been serving in the Colorado strike district, will command the detachment. This is the first time that United States soldiers have been called upon to enforce a court's orders since 1894, when President Cleveland used the army in the Chicago strike to protect the mails and carry out orders of Federal courts. The regular army has been serving in the Colorado strike district, but not through disregard of the courts.


