The question of license or no license for Bennington is the great issue at tomorrow's election. It is the sort of a contest that for some reason always arouses some hard feelings, but there is no good reason why it should. Every man should vote on the question according to his best judgment and then not grumble at the result.

Don't think that you have done full duty in voting on the license question. Every article in the warning is of importance and especially the one in regard to an appropriation for a county farm agent. Bennington doesn't get as much benefit from this as some of the other towns but Bennington should show its public spirit by adding this department for the benefit of the rest of the county.

The village caucus Saturday night emphasized the need of an available public hall for gatherings of the kind. There isn't a place in the village except the new high school hall that will accommodate a large caucus and other halls are so often rented for dances that a large caucus is much hampered. Bennington needs a new town hall, but until one is secured it should be possible to secure the high school hall. While a caucus is sometimes muddy-footed and boisterous, it is an important part of civil government. A caucus like that of Saturday occupying two rooms, two halls and a stairway is not in a position to transact its business to the best advantage.

AUDITORS' REPORT

Your Auditors respectfully report: We have examined the accounts and vouchers of your Selectmen, Collectors, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Trustee of Cemetery Fund and Highway Commissioners, and find them correct.

We have cancelled all orders paid by the Treasurer, drawn by the Selectmen, Highway Commissioners and Trustee of Cemetery Fund; checks of Treasurer issued on account of "Births and Deaths"; also 184 coupons of the four per cent. refunding Bonds, amounting to \$2,680.00.

We have also expunged from the Accounts of the Town, Order No. 374 dated December 31, 1908, to May Mar-

tin \$1.04, Order No. 380 dated December 31, 1908, to W. Hurley, 75c, liability for same having expired by limitation.

At the present time there are outstanding two interest bearing Selectmen's orders aggregating \$15,146.78 at four per cent. interest, which are payable at the pleasure of the Town. The amount of \$1,780.34 received from the State for account of J. C. Colgate is still in the Town treasury awaiting the pleasure of Mr. Colgate.

In view of the foregoing showing, and the possibility of the levy of a Direct State Tax for the coming year, we recommend that a tax of eighty cents (\$80) on the dollar be laid for the general expenses of the town; and the usual twenty cents (20c) laid

by the State for Highway purposes, making the total Tax of one hundred cents (100c) on the dollar of the grand list.

was reviewed by Mr. Proctor of Proctor, chairman of the committee on appropriations, at the morning session. He estimated the current revenue and showed the need of going slow on additional appropriations.

The Senate ordered to a third reading S. 90, which provides for juvenile courts in municipal courts for delinquent and dependent children. It is one of Senator Carver's bills.

The bill enabling the formation of co-operative fire insurance companies, introduced by Mr. Foote, was ordered to the third reading by the House.

The marriage license bill, introduced by Mr. Black of Burlington, was ordered to a third reading by the House. This provides that five days elapse between the issuing of marriage licenses and the solemnization of marriage. It is designed to prevent hasty, runaway marriages.

FREAK CALF IS THRIVING

Thomas Burke, Jr., Expects to Raise Animal Which Has Six Legs

Rutland, Feb. 24—The freak calf which was born Saturday on the farm of Thomas Burke, Jr. on the Castleton road, is alive and active and the owner believes it will develop into a healthy heifer. Mr. Burke in speaking of the animal stated that he had already been offered a good price for the calf, but had refused to sell as he intends exhibiting the animal at the fairs next fall.

The calf weighs about 75 pounds, being rather large for its age. It is perfectly formed in every respect with the one exception of two extra legs, both attached to the right shoulder near the spine. The superfluous legs are well formed, but smaller than the others and each hoof contains three toes. The circulation of blood in the extra legs seems to be perfect and on one another growth covered with hair has started out which seems to have been the formation of another leg although only about an inch in diameter and about seven inches long.

The extra legs swing as the animal walks though otherwise they do not seem to effect it. A number of people have called to inspect the calf, although visitors are not allowed to touch it for fear of hurting the extra legs, which it is feared will become sore through handling.
