ITALIANS GAINING AND AUSTRIANS FALLING BACK

No Hard Fighting Yet But Skirmishing Along Whole Frontier

ITALIANS NEARING CRITICAL POINT

Have Taken Several Small Villages and Last Night Were Only 16 Miles Northwest of Trieste.

Rome, May 27—The rapid advance of the Italian armies which invaded Austria on the east has carried part of the forces across the Isonzo River to Montebello, only sixteen miles northwest of Trieste.

Another force which penetrated farther to the north in the Crownland of Gorizia and Gradisca has repaired the railroad beyond the Carnians and is marching on Gorizia the capital.

Sharp fighting has occurred on the Triol-Trentino frontier, where the Austrians are being driven back in advance guard engagements.

The following official statement was issued today:

On May 25 on the Tyrol-Trentino frontier the Italian troops occupied the heights of Montebello, from which point the enemy was forced to retreat abandoning tents and material.

The Italian artillery located the Austrian batteries at Tomazzo and silenced the enemy's fire.

TWO MORE BRITISH WARSHIPS SENT TO DESTRUCTION

Turks Sink Majestic and Princess Irene Blown to Pieces

BATTLESHIP VICTIM OF TORPEDO

Auxiliary Cruiser Shattered by Explosion and All But One of a Crew of 250 Killed.

London, May 29—All the crew of 250 men of the British steamer Princess Irene, except one man, and in addition 78 dockers who were at work on board the steamer, lost their lives yesterday when the vessel was blown up by an explosion on board in Sheerness harbor on the Thames.

The admiral in reporting the destruction of the Princess Irene says: "The Princess Irene was accidentally blown up in Sheerness harbor this morning. So far as is yet known, only one survivor was picked up.

Three men belonging to the ship were not on board at the time of the disaster. Several men belonging to vessels lying close to the Princess Irene were wounded by falling splinters.

London, May 29—It is announced at Constantinople that the British battleship Majestic was sunk early yesterday morning off Seddul Bahr, which lies at the southern point of the Gallipoli peninsula.

The Majestic was the oldest battleship on the active list of the British navy is the sixth capital ship lost by the allies since the beginning of the operations against the Dardanelles, and the second which has fallen a victim to German submarines which recently arrived in these waters.

The torpedoing and sinking of the Majestic is announced by the admiralty in the following statement: "An enemy submarine torpedoed and sank H. M. S. Majestic, Capt. H. E. G. Talbot, this morning while it was supporting the army on the Gallipoli peninsula. Nearly all the officers and men were saved."

The battleship Majestic was a vessel of 14,900 tons and of 10,000 horsepower capacity. Her officers and crew on a peace footing aggregated 757. The Majestic, which was built in 1895, carried four 12-inch, 12 six-inch and 16 three-inch guns and the 12 three-pounder guns. In addition the vessel was armed with five 18-inch torpedo tubes.

The sinking of the Majestic makes the fifth British battleship lost in the Dardanelles campaign and the second by a hostile submarine, the Triumph having been sent to the bottom in the gulf of Saros Wednesday. The French also have lost one battleship in the Turkish campaign—the Bouvet.

BERNSTORFF ASKS GERMANY TO BE MORE PROMPT

Advises Berlin That the Delay is Causing Adverse Comment

AGREEMENT ON FACTS DESIRED

Report Indicates That Germans May Not Accept the Lusitania Version as Publicly Understood.

Berlin, May 28.—The foreign office has received a cablegram from Ambassador Bernstorff urging an early reply to the American note. The sinking of the Nebraska, the ambassador cables, has created much adverse sentiment in America.

Berlin, May 28, via Amsterdam, May 27—Germany's answer to the American note is going to be a serious affair. The first installment is going forward on Friday, preceded by verbal expressions of friendship and good will to Ambassador Gerard tomorrow.

I learn that the preliminary note will not contain Germany's definite answer, but will be exclusively a statement of the facts in the several cases involved as the Germans see them, with a courteous request to the American government to confirm their accuracy in order to reach a full agreement on the basic facts, which, in the Lusitania case, will probably include the important point, alleged by Germany, that she was an auxiliary cruiser and that her cargo included arms and ammunition, possibly also that the Lusitania was armed.

A high official of the Foreign office told me the idea was first to get all the facts straight so as to avoid the possibility of Germany and America engaging in discussions in which they might use their cases on facts which were at variance—in other words, to get together on a sound working basis.

Germany's full and definite answer will follow promptly on receipt of advice that the American Government cannot find the facts as stated by Germany to be correct.

Washington, May 28.—Capt. J. W. Oman of the American cruiser North Carolina has wired the navy department that the cruiser is ashore in the inner harbor at Alexandria.
