It begins to look as though none of the gentlemen who would like to succeed Senator Carroll S. Page have the nerve to go into the contest. If this proves to be the case the senator probably won't be seriously offended.

Calvin Coolidge, who was nominated for lieutenant-governor on the republican ticket in the Massachusetts primaries on Tuesday, is a Vermont native, the son of John Coolidge of Plymouth, a well-known citizen of Windsor county and a member of the Vermont senate in 1908. Evidently the members of the republican party in Massachusetts have a good opinion of the younger Coolidge, for he polled more votes than any other candidate on his ticket. His total vote was exceeded by that of only one candidate, David I. Walsh, democratic candidate for re-nomination as governor, who ran ahead of Coolidge by the small margin of 625 votes. Coolidge defeated his opposing candidate, Gay A. Ham, by a majority of 23,924.

George C. Dixon, who sold the Wilmington Times two years ago, has bought the Londonderry Sifter of O. R. Clayton. Mr. Clayton is a lawyer and will devote his time to the practice of law. The Sifter, under his administration, has been a good paper and Mr. Dixon will strive to make it better. The field is small and a paper in a territory like that has a hard struggle. The people of the South Londonderry and vicinity should give their local paper cordial and unanimous support even if they don't always agree with the editor in his opinions. Editors are only human and often wrong, but they are practically always loyal to their town and section and do the best they can for its welfare and usually more than their income warrants.

E. A. Christy of Silver Creek, N. Y. is searching for records of descendants of the Mooney and Higgins families which lived in this section more than 100 years ago and would be glad to receive information from anyone who knows. James Mooney was a land owner, at least as early as 1793 and 1801 in the town of Cambridge, Washington county, N. Y., owning a part of each lots No. 3 and No. 4 of the second or general division of the patent of Cambridge. He died before Aug. 20, 1803 at which date his widow sold the above located farm. His widow's name was Jane Mooney. He left at least two sisters, Anna Mooney, then the wife of Isaac Wood, Sr., of the town and county of Bennington State of Vermont, and his sister, Jean Mooney who married Cornelius Higgins of Cambridge, Mr. Christy thinks there were several other children in the Mooney family, other than the three mentioned.


