IRELAND MAY BE CARDINAL

Pope Not to Make Appointments From Belligerent Nations.

Because of jealousies that inevitably would be aroused by selecting new cardinals among the belligerent nations, and also on account of the difficulties that foreign cardinals would encounter in coming to Rome, the pope has intended not to hold another consistory until the war is over, says a dispatch from Rome. But owing to vacancies in the sacred college—the last new cardinals having been created May 19, 1914,—the idea of a consistory is again rumored in Vatican circles.

It is being suggested that the pope will not create cardinals belonging to the belligerent countries but appoint only those living in Rome or neutral countries. In this case, it is said, at Rome, Archbishop Ireland of St. Paul may be included.

FURNISHING A ROOM.

Try to Convey the Impression of Repose and Hominess.

The furniture which we select should be designed for its livable qualities. It is not a question of whether the room is furnished consistently with Louis XVI, furniture or with empire or with something else, but whether the furniture combines with the walls and floors and ceiling to complete a room with a single impression—hominess, restfulness, repose.

Now, repose and restfulness depend very largely upon color harmonies, and it is therefore well that our furniture harmonize in this respect. A room which contains a chair or two in walnut, others in mahogany and fumed oak and a sofa in golden oak cannot help being bad. Such a room is bound to affect the nerves of every sensitive person who comes into the room.

For this reason a room should be very predominantly mahogany in color, very predominantly fumed oak or very predominantly something else, but it should not be a mixture. With a painted interior of gray, mahogany will go very beautifully, whether it be Chipendale, Sheraton or colonial or all three mixed.—Lionel Robertson and T. C. O'Donnell in Good Health.

GOOD BOOKS.

When Personally Owned They Gather a Wealth of Association.

Cultivated men and women have always good books among their most valued possessions, and one cannot believe that this taste can be sacrificed without definite loss to our civilization.

Donizetti and Coffee.

It was his habit to shut himself up in his room with writing materials and three or four coffeepots full of steaming coffee. When these were emptied he ordered in three or four more and, those disposed of in their turn, another three or four. His biographer says that the amount of coffee he drank was "fabulous" and one can well believe it. The effect on his once fine constitution was deplorable. His face shriveled and turned yellow, his lips became black, and with the inevitable breakdown of his nervous system his genius fell rapidly into premature decay.

A Lesson in Hate

To this generation it seems as if Lincoln must have had the confidence of his party, yet Lincoln never had the confidence of the Republican party. If by party we mean the managing politicians in and out of Congress who control party affairs.

When a visitor to the National Capitol in the winter of 1863 expressed a desire to meet members of Congress who were friendly to President Lincoln, Isaac N. Arnold of Illinois was pointed out to him as the only friend that Lincoln had in Congress.

At the very hour of his assassination the Republican leaders of the House and Senate were plotting to thwart his plans for the reconstruction of the Southern States; and when Andrew Johnson attempted to carry out Lincoln's policy Johnson was impeached.

In the perspective of history, Lincoln now occupies a niche among the great figures of all time, but in his own day and his own crisis he was the most abused President that ever occupied the White House. Neither before nor since has any President of the United States been subjected to such wholesale personal vituperation.

While living, the greatest of Americans was a "gorilla," a "baboon," a "clown," a "butcher," a "hellhound of slavery," a "traitor," a "despot," a "usurper," an "ignorant backwoods lawyer," a "fool, a scoundrel and a villain," to hysterical critics. Even the merit of disinterested patriotism was denied to him by extremists, and New York in particular reeked with denunciation of him. The Republican managers would have been glad to prevent his re-nomination if they could have found a way of pushing him aside. As it was, he was not re-nominated as a Republican candidate but as a Union candidate of Republican and War Democrats.

The clamor against him became so great that in the midst of the 1864 campaign he believed that defeat was certain and made preparations to cooperate with McClellan immediately after election in a last desperate attempt to save the Union.

Congress never regarded Lincoln until after his death as anything more important than a political accident. The practical politicians of his party tolerated him as a dispenser of patronage, but nothing more. Generals like McClellan and Hooker carried their disrespect to the point of insubordination. Stanton, who was Lincoln's Secretary of War, made no pretense of concealing his contempt for the President. The financial interests of New York city were in a continuing conspiracy against him. To the Brahmin class he was little more than the uncouth retailer of vulgar stories whose presence in the White House was a menace to a Nation tottering on the brink of destruction.

Contemporary opinion of public men is always cock-sure of itself, but time has a habit of playing strange pranks with contemporary opinions. It is possible that certain elements of the present generation, which is certain that wisdom will die with it, may be found to have been mistaken in the criticism that they are pouring out in this great world crisis, upon their Government and upon the men who are charged with the direct personal responsibility for the affairs of government.—Vermont Advance.
