CLOUDS AND RAIN FOR BENNINGTON AUTO JUNKET

Seventeen Cars Defy Weather on Run to Brattleboro

MOIST BUT ENTHUSIASTIC

About 65 Board of Trade Members and Guests Left at 9:15 This Morning

Lowering skies and the drizzle of a murky morning failed to dampen the enthusiasm of about 65 members of the Bennington Board of Trade and their guests who started for Brattleboro at 9:15 this morning on the first board of trade junket the local men have ever undertaken.

The start was a trifle delayed owing to the doubtful condition of the weather and many who had planned to go up to last night changed their minds at the last moment at the promise of muddy roads and curtailed automobiles. Seventeen cars, however, left Putnam house square from 9:15 to 9:45.

The long procession was headed by A. J. Cooper's big car driven by Newton M. Cottrell and carrying two national flags. In the pilot car beside Mr. Cooper and Mr. Cottrell were H. B. Hutchins and J. M. Ayres. President William H. Nichols and Secretary E. S. Harris were somewhat delayed by the rain involved in getting the long line into shape, finding room for those who did not own cars and acting as weather prophets of optimism for those who failed to see any pleasure in automobiling in cars goggy with chains and hooded from the drizzle.

The last car got away half an hour after pilot, giving Joseph Evans ample time to decorate nearly all of the machines with Bennington streamers and catch the last one himself. Most of the auto drivers were delayed by putting on their chains before the start, in order to keep the machines in line while climbing Woodford mountain.

About a dozen men and three or four additional machines joined the party as it passed through Wilmington. The party arrived in Brattleboro shortly before noon where they were met by the combined boards of trade of Brattleboro and Bellows Falls and dinner was served to about 150 men. GHOST CARNIVAL IN OBSERVANCE OF HALLOWE'EN

Annual Parade to be Held Tomorrow Evening

LINE OF MARCH FORMS AT 7:15

Red Fire Will Burn on Main Street—Music by Bennington City Band.

The Halloween carnival for the young people, Saturday night, promises to be a large and happy affair. Numerous groups and a large number of individuals have already signified their intention of entering and making this carnival the best and biggest ever. Many of the leading merchants along Main and North streets have offered to burn colored fire, so that the line of march will be illuminated along the entire route.

All the participants are to assemble at the new post office corner at seven o'clock. Here they will be assigned to various groups according to the costume worn, under leaders in the following order:

Jack O' Lantern section, directed by Mrs. Guy B. Johnson. Playground Junior Ball Team, Wm. Greenwood, captain, directed by Mrs. Lester Nichols. Holloween's Witches: 5th and 8th grade gym class, directed by Miss Martha Wellington. Swastikas Camp Fire Girls, directed by Miss Florence Walbridge. Y. M. C. A. Junior Boys, directed by Oscar Ellwell. Holloween's spooks, 7 and 8 grade gym class, directed by Miss Whipple. Witches Umbrella Group, directed by Miss Maud Galusha. Boy Scouts, directed by Kenneth Fauley.

Maskers, (this section to include all those who wear masks) directed by Mrs. G. P. Endress. Costume Group, (for all those who have a special costume) directed by Miss Dorothy Carver. Miscellaneous; directed by Miss Ethel Davenport.

At 7:45 the line of march will pass up Main street as far as Valentine, counter march down Main street, then parade to the playground by way of North street. The playground will be lighted by bon fires and colored fire. Simple refreshments will be given to all children in the parade, after which a short entertainment of shadow pictures will be furnished on the pavilion. In case of rain tomorrow night the parade will not be held.

State Highway Commissioner Bates is to be the guest of honor and the purpose of the gathering will be to impress on him the very earnest desire of the people of Bennington and Windham counties to have the state construct an adequate highway over the mountain between Bennington and Brattleboro, some 25 or 30 miles. Bennington is the southern gateway of Vermont. Automobile travel from New York way is now diverted to Manchester, Rutland and Woodstock. With a state road over the mountain some of the travel will go through Brattleboro and Bellows Falls. Estimates of the cost vary from \$75,000 to \$125,000.

About 20 autos have agreed to make the trip. This means that at least 80 men can be accommodated. The autos will gather in the square about 9:30 tomorrow morning and every man who has signified his intention of going, should be on hand not a minute later than 9:40.

HORSE THREW KING GEORGE DURING ARMY REVIEW

Sovereign Confirmed to His Bed With Severe Bruises

PRINCE OF WALES ARRIVES

His Presence at Buckingham Palace Causes Much Uneasiness in England.

London, Oct. 29.—King George is confined to his bed because of severe bruises received when he was thrown from his horse while reviewing the allied armies in France.

The king's horse became frightened by the huzzas of the soldiers and the rider was unable to control the animal.

The Prince of Wales arrived at Buckingham palace from France this afternoon which would appear to indicate that the injuries of the king were more severe than is reported officially.

The government announcement was that the king would be confined to his bed "for the present."


