CINCINNATI LOST \$5400.

Reds' Official Figures Show Stockholders Suffer Little Financially.

The first official information of a financial loss in organized baseball comes from Cincinnati, and if that can be considered an average case, the national sport has not suffered so heavily as the public has been led to believe. In the reorganization of the Reds, which has just been done, it was necessary for President Herrmann to make a financial statement and this shows that the Reds lost but \$5400, notwithstanding the large sums paid out for the purchase of players, training expenses, etc.

The stockholders of the Cincinnati club lost less than it costs them annually to run their motor cars. As Cincinnati was considered a big loser, it is evident that very few of the organized baseball clubs lost any money at all. It is known the Giants, Braves and Phillies made money.

HARD TO KILL

Catalog of Alleged Deaths of German Crown Prince.

The overseas news agency in Berlin under the title "Hard to kill," has given out for publication what it says is a history of the German crown prince during the war, as compiled by a Danish newspaper from reports given out by Germany's enemies. The history follows:

August 5, 1914, victim of an attempt against his life in Berlin.

August 18, severely wounded on the French frontier.

August 20, second attempt against his life, in which he lost one leg.

August 24, third attempt against his life.

September 4, committed suicide.

September 13, died in a Brussels hospital.

September 15, commanded an attack near Verdun.

September 16, wounded by a shrapnel in Poland.

September 18, once more wounded on the French front.

September 20, is hastened to his death-bed.

October 24, buried in Berlin.

October 25, his body found on the battlefield.

November 3, once more buried.

November 4, once more killed by the French.

November 8, insane, taken to a lonely castle.

November 13, appointed chief commander on the east front.

November 17, once more killed.

January 16, 1915, once more wounded.

February 3, sent home.
