This Lusitania controversy appears to have come out like a country prize-fight. Both claim a notable victory. The United States wins because Germany accepts responsibility and promises not to do it again. Germany wins because she didn't disavow in any words that admit that her act was illegal. Great thing, this diplomacy.

A party of Americans, who came by train from the city of Mexico to Vera Cruz, through the heart of Old Mexico, report that they traveled in an armored train that was several times fired upon. They state that the country is infested by bandits, that labor and industry are at a standstill, that life and property are not safe and that typhus, small-pox and other diseases are raging. It is not right to jump to the conclusion from this that the Carranza government is a failure but it is added evidence that conditions in Mexico are most deplorable. The reports which come to the American newspapers from Carranza sources tell of outrages by Villa followers, would read about the same if they came from Villista sources except that they would declare that the outrages were committed by Carranza partisans. There is no essential difference between the Carranza bandits and the Villa bandits. The two leaders were long time partners and their virtues probably come up to about the same level. It is the duty of the United States to step in and establish a stable government for Mexico. If the United States doesn't do it some European country will after the European war is over. For two years now the United States has shirked its duty in Mexico. If this duty had been done at the beginning it would probably have cost fewer American lives than have been frittered away in the long drawn out revolutions.

Telegrams in 1767. Telegraphing by semaphore was invented by Richard Lovell Edgeworth in 1767 and was first regularly established by the French military authorities in 1794. The system was introduced into England the following year by Lord George Murray, and by its means the admiralty was placed within a few minutes of Portsmouth or Plymouth. The apparatus consisted of shutters placed on the top of towers built on commanding sites at intervals of from five to ten miles. Greenwich time at 1 o'clock daily was passed from London to Portsmouth and acknowledged commonly within three-quarters of a minute in clear weather.—London Mirror.

Den hire de man dats buy my hoss to drive me out to town; I stop in all de beeg garage and haf dem drive me roum' An' by an' by I see one car dat cos' me vera cheap.

He ronne just 23 thousand mile an' don't cos' moche to keep. De man dats run dat beeg Garage hees name ez Joe Nadeau. He's talk to me something lak dis just sam' as ef he know; He say date good one for de man dats never roone a car. It's not geev too moche troublement wit' just one cylinder; An' if I ronne it troo de fance or climb him up a tree, It's not so bad lak some new car dat cos' me moche money. He say, I tell you wat I'll do, you bought dat aut'mobile. An' I'll allow you just same price in trade if you come squeal.

I say I'm goin to bought dat car, I pay de money down. I go one mile in half past two mos' all de way from town; One gallon of de gasoline is las' heem quite a while. But I haf to fill hees water tank 'bout every two-three mile. When I was drive on top de church, an' every place I goes I always wore my overal. I'm 'traid I'll spoil my clothes. I often take de clutch apart, transmission gears also, An' take dat motor outside in before some tam he'll go.

I swop it off for one new car, repair dey say was cheap. It lucky ting for me dey was 'fore I had run three week; I buy some "timer" dem some rods, mos' all de nuts was gone. An' bought me 50 oder t'ings dey forgot to put on. Some shock absorber, 'lectric lights, some tire holder too. I mak de price lak some beeg car before dat I set troo. An' wen I ride about a mile "Mon Dieu!" how I was sore; I fin' de girl ride wit' me once but never ride some more.

I swop once more for noder car dats cos' me very low, I wear my bestest Sunday clothes now every plac I go; It don't cos' much for gasoline lak w'at it did before, One gallon tak me twenty-mile and of-

ten three-four more. De girl he's always ready now for ride de secon' time. An' often say going' up de hill, "Gee, see dat 'Maxwell' climb." Jus' turn de switch, press down de foot, it's always sure to go. If you don't know wat car to bought, ask Jean Bateese Bartoux.
