RICHARD HARDING DAVIS

Popular Author Was Correspondent of Five Wars.

Richard Harding Davis, the author, who died suddenly of heart disease at his home in Mount Kisco, N. Y., Tuesday night, was not only an author of popular fiction and a playwright, but was also a veteran correspondent of five wars including the present. He was born in Philadelphia in 1864, the son of L. Clarke Davis and Rebecca Harding Davis, also a writer.

After being educated at Lehigh and Johns Hopkins Universities, Mr. Davis entered journalism, starting with The Philadelphia Press and later serving on The New York Sun. He was correspondent during the Turco-Greek war, Spanish-American, South African and Russian-Japanese wars for The London Times and The New York Herald, and during the present war wrote dispatches for a syndicate from the French front.

One of his earliest and most widely read books, "Soldiers of Fortune," was published in 1899, and in succeeding years he wrote more than thirty volumes of fiction and war experiences, together with a number of plays and numerous short stories of magazines. A number of them he published as "Gallagher and Other Stories," "Gallagher" being one of his early stories which won him popularity.

In 1899 Mr. Davis married Cecil Clark, daughter of J. M. Clark of Chicago, and was divorced by her in 1912. A few days after the divorce was signed Mr. Davis married Miss McCoy, who was the famous Yama Yama girl in a popular musical comedy. A daughter, Hope Davis, was born.

### STRIKES LIKE A HAWK

How German Aviator Lies in Wait for His Enemies.

The London Daily Mail's correspondent at British headquarters, who has been studying the work of the famous German aviator, Lieut. Immelmann, says: "Immelmann is a doughty enemy, but his methods are less heroic than scientific. He does not seek adventure as such, or run avoidable risks; but he hunts deliberately with the single aim of destroying enemy aircraft. His plan is simple, but effective. He mounts to a great height—usually 13,000 feet, which, of course, can only be reached under favorable weather and cloud conditions.

"Thus he has great reserve of speed and striking power and can observe with impunity even well over the British line, because the anti-aircraft artillery cannot reach him. As soon as he observes an enemy plane below he swoops in one long, straight and even drive. His plan is to pass in a rapid diagonal just behind the enemy, at whom he fires continuously as soon as he comes within range. It is hit or miss with him.

"Just as some hawks strike once and once only, and if they fail make no effort to retrieve the issue, so with Immelmann. Whatever his success or lack of success while emptying his drum of bullets, he does not alter his tactics. He makes no effort to pursue, but continues to dive until it brings him safe home."

### CAPTURE IMPORTANT

German Estimate of Strength of Haucourt.

A dispatch from Berlin dated Thursday says: "After battering down the bitterest opposition imaginable, the Germans yesterday took possession of the village of Haucourt, northwest of Verdun, and moved one step nearer the fortress in their slow but steady advance. The capture of Haucourt is universally regarded as one of the most important recent developments in the German offensive, as the position formed a supporting point for the French left wing, and as from it a large section of the French line and fortifications can be taken under the German fire, including the strongly fortified village of Bethincourt, lying on Forges brook, which the Germans now have crossed for the first time. Notwithstanding the staunchness of the French opposition, Haucourt was captured with losses which are officially characterized as 'extraordinarily light,' in contradiction to French reports.

"The French claims of the last few days that their positions north of Forges brook were voluntarily evacuated, in some cases even without knowledge of the Germans, are denied in the strongest of terms here, the German assertion being that the large number of prisoners taken and the bitter opposition encountered at each step, just as at Haucourt, absolutely refute such statements.

### STATE NEWS

Navigation on Lake Champlain, which usually begins about the middle of April, is somewhat delayed this year, the steamer Ticonderoga being scheduled to make her first trip April 27, although if conditions are favorable she will start on the 29th. The steamers Ticonderoga, Vermont and Chateaugay, which have been in winter quarters at Shelburne harbor since the stopping of the lake traffic in the late fall, have undergone their usual overhauling and retouching and are now in first class condition for the summer season. The Vermont will begin her service on May 29 and the Chateaugay will begin to carry her excursion passengers about the middle of June. The Lake George steamers, the Mohican, Horicon and Sagamore, will begin carrying passengers at the same time as the Ticonderoga, Vermont and Chateaugay, respectively.

### GERMANY MAKES REPLY

Answer to Sussex Inquiry Given to Ambassador Gerard. Berlin, April 12.—The German government's reply to the American inquiry regarding the steamship Sussex and four other vessels which have been sunk or damaged was delivered yesterday to the American embassy.

AUTHOR TO AID BAKER

Meredith Nicholson Slated for Assistant Secretary of War.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 12.—Meredith Nicholson of this city, an author, practically has been agreed upon by President Wilson and Secretary Baker at Washington, for appointment as assistant secretary of war. Mr. Nicholson is a close personal friend of Mr. Baker and is understood to have the support of Vice-President Marshall.


