All Vermonters who immigrate to other commonwealths do not have to grow up to acquire distinction. A 29-months old baby born in Grafton was the star of an exhibit recently held at Northampton, Mass., and in which there were a hundred contesting infants. Vive Vermont!

One thousand dollars for a four-year-old cow is pretty big money for one single "critter," but it is the price recently laid down at Bellows Falls for a pure bred registered Holstein. If the bovine lady had been only a "critter" the price would have been divided by twenty. The moral in this instance, like the moral in nearly every instance, is to get out of the "critter" class.

The liquor licensees at Rutland had been paying \$12,750 for the privilege of selling booze. The license-commissioners reduced the fees to \$10,000 and the grateful dispensers of intoxicants made the city a present of \$2,750. After a trial a jury decides that the money belongs to the city and not to the state, which is supposed to get all of the cash paid for liquor licenses. It is a very pretty performance of juggling with the city getting a part of the jug. If a precedent has been established we may expect a regular system of minimum license fees and a custom of licensees making presents to towns or cities voting wet.—Hartleboro Phoenix.

The original juggling took place in the legislature. As the local option law was first framed, and as it remained in force for a number of years, it provided that the towns which voted for license should receive the fees. The law was later amended so as to convert the money into the state treasury, presumably on the ground that in its original form the financial consideration might induce some citizens, who otherwise would be disposed to keep their communities dry, to cast their votes for license. The change was not favorably received in a number of the larger towns which have at different times voted for license, hence the juggling to which the Phoenix refers.


