Rutland is fortunate in securing Congressman Frank L. Greene for Memorial day speaker. Mr. Greene always has something to say worth hearing.

Harper's Weekly, after a creditable career of over sixty years has suspended publication. The competition in the periodical field is most acute and another contributing cause has undoubtedly been the editorial acrobats of the Weekly since it passed out of the hands of the Harper company.

The new daily at St. Johnsbury, the Morning Caledonian, has made its appearance and is a creditable publication, but it needs more advertising to be a financial success. No matter how good a newspaper may be it cannot last long without a generous advertising patronage.

The failure of the rearing station at the Duck pond in Arlington is to be regretted and will be regretted by all Bennington county fishermen, but it is not so serious as might at first appear. It will merely put off the work for a year. Fortunately the property had not been bought and most of the material can be moved to some new site. Possibly it might be well to try the location at East Arlington where the U. S. government bureau did some experimental work several years ago. Another possible location is just below the big spring west of Tenor meadows in Woodford. Still another that has been suggested is the stream that flows into South Shaftsbury from the old mill about two miles north.

### SOMETHING ABOUT MAY

Where It Derived Its Name—Origin of Decoration Day.

Just where or how the month of May derived its name is not easily determined. What is regarded as authority, however, says the name originated from the word *Maiores*, the senate in the original constitution of Rome. The old version that May was named in honor of Maia, mother of Hermes, is now said to be erroneous and was merely surmised because of the similarity of the two names.

With the exception of Decoration day, on the 30th, the month is without a holiday day or a day given special importance either by tradition or history. Up until half a century ago, the opening day of the month was almost universally observed as "May day," when outdoor festivals were held, and when a May pole was the central attraction. On the evening before May 1st, baskets of flowers were distributed from friend to friend, the distribution generally being in secret. The baskets were left on the door steps after night had fallen.

There are different versions of the origin of Decoration day. Tradition has it that a German soldier who, coming to this country at the time the Civil war broke out, enlisted. After the war was over he remarked that in Germany it was customary to scatter flowers on the graves of soldiers once a year. This is supposed to be the origin of Decoration day. In May 1868, Adjutant General M. P. Sibley suggested this custom to General Logan of the G. A. R., who immediately issued an order in which he named the 30th of May, 1868—"For the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country and whose bodies lie in almost every city, village or hamlet churchyard in the land."
