INVESTIGATING PARALYSIS

Scientists Begin Research Work in New York Today.

New York, Aug. 2.—A series of investigations with the object of solving problems which have arisen from the epidemic of infantile paralysis in this city will be begun here tomorrow by several of the leading pathologists and bacteriologists of the country. Some of the out of town experts arrived tonight. Dr. Simon Flexner of the Rockefeller institute for medical research, probably will preside at the investigations.

When the physicians meet it is planned to discuss thoroughly the nature of the epidemic and its progress. Then the doctors will be organized into committees to divide the work of investigation. Sessions will continue tomorrow and Friday after which the physicians will take cultures of the disease to their laboratories and endeavor to find a specific.

It was announced tonight that thus far 38 persons classed as adults all over 15 years have had the disease. One of the deaths reported today was the four-year-old daughter of Dr. Thomas C. Chalmers, an attending physician in the Queensboro hospital, where several cases have been treated. Forty-one children died and 166 were stricken in the greater city during the last 24 hours with the disease.

The drift of the plague shifted to Manhattan today and there more deaths and new cases reported in that bureau than at anytime since the inception of the plague. Jersey City reported three more deaths and two cases and reports from other nearby cities indicated that the epidemic was far from being under control.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Thirty additional cases of infantile paralysis and two deaths from the disease were reported to the state department of health during the 24 hours ending at 5 p. m. today from different parts of the state not including the city of New York. The cases now aggregate 567 with a total of 45 deaths.

The deaths were at Poughkeepsie which also headed the list in the number of new cases eight. Other cases were reported as follows:

Yonkers, 2; Beacon, 2; Scarsdale Springs, 2; Utica, 2; Highland, White Plains, Fishkill, Galatin, Hancock, Roslyn, Hope, Harrison, Cornwall-on-the-Hudson, Piermont, East Norwich, Northville, Rockville Center and Goshen one each.

JACKSONVILLE PEN THIRD

White Leghorns from Vermont Appear Among Best in Laying Contest.

The hens in the fifth international egg laying contest at Storrs, Conn., yielded a total of 3,629 eggs in the thirty-eight week of the contest. The agricultural college pen of "Oregon" from Corvallis, Oregon, was an easy first with a production of 61 eggs.

Francis P. Lincoln's pen of White Leghorns from Mount Carmel, Conn., was second with 56 eggs, and George Phillips' pen of the same breed from Seymour, Conn., won third place with a yield of 55 eggs.

Mendelay Poultry Yards' pen of Barred Rocks from Springfield, Ohio, Abel Latham's pen of White Leghorns from Brierfield, Eng., and W. E. Atkinson's pen of Leghorns from Wallingford, Conn., all tied for fourth place with 52 eggs each.

There was a total of 24 pens including Barred, White, and Columbian Rocks, White Wyandottes, Rhode Island Reds, White Leghorns, Mottled Anconas, and "Oregon" which made perfect individual scores for the week.

During the past two years the Storrs experiment station has carried on in Connecticut a campaign against bacillary white diarrhea of young chickens, a disease which is transmitted to the little chickens through the ovary of the mother. The experiment station has not of course undertaken to do this work outside of the state, but the college arranged to have the test made without charge on all birds sent to the laying competition. This test, which is known as the agglutination method of determining an ovarian infection, involves drawing from the wing vein a sample of blood but such a small amount that the fowls are not injured nor is their egg yield retarded or otherwise adversely affected. The hens in the contest were tested last week and approximately 30 birds were found to be infected.

Under the best three pens of White Leghorns the pen of Frank R. Hancock, of Jacksonville, appears in third place.
