## The KITCHEN CUPBOARD

### WASH DAY MENU.

### Luncheon Dishes.

- DELICIOUS STEW.**—A pound stew beef, two pounds pork chops, two onions. Put in a layer of pork, then a layer of beef and a little onion, season each layer with salt and pepper. Continue until all the meat is used, but cover as closely as possible and set in a large boiler of boiling water. Put a cover on the large boiler too. Do not uncover the small boiler for three and one-half hours, then you will find lots of gravy on the meat.
- Broiled Halibut.**—Broil one side of a piece of halibut until heated through, then turn and spread the other side with a paste of butter and flour, flavor with minced onion and tomato pulp. Cook till brown and serve with the

### crust side up.

**Salmon Mold.**—One-quarter box of gelatin, two tablespoonfuls cold water, two teaspoonfuls salt, a teaspoonful mustard, yolks of two eggs, one and one-half tablespoonfuls melted butter, three quarters cupful milk, two tablespoonfuls vinegar, few grains cayenne. Soak gelatin in cold water five minutes. Mix egg yolks with dry ingredients, add butter, milk and vinegar. Cook over boiling water until mixture thickens. Add gelatin and shredded salmon and turn into mold. Garnish with olives and sliced cucumbers.

**Banana Fritters.**—Peel, scrape and press two large bananas through a sieve and add the beaten yolks of two eggs, a teaspoonful of sugar, a tablespoonful of melted butter, a scant half cupful of milk and one and one-half cupfuls of flour mixed and sifted with a teaspoonful of baking powder. Beat thoroughly with an egg beater, fold in the stiffly beaten whites, drop from a spoon into deep hot fat and fry a light brown.

**Chicken Sandwiches.**—Boiled chicken goes a deal further, and it has the advantage of being more tender. Boil the chickens in only enough water to cover them, adding an onion and a tablespoonful of Worcestershire sauce for each one. Let them simmer until meat is very tender, then strip off the skin and shred the chicken with the fingers. Put the filling on a lettuce leaf between thin white bread, adding salt and cayenne before closing.
