How to Make Bechamel Sauce.  
Put a tablespoonful of butter in a saucepan and as it melts add half an onion, chopped fine, and let it stew till tender, but do not let it brown. Mince two ounces of raw ham, add the ham and let it brown. Then add a stick of celery, chopped fine, and half a carrot, also chopped fine. Add a bunch of sweet herbs, chopped fine; two cloves and four allspices. Let all simmer gently for two minutes without browning. Then add half a pint of cream by degrees, but do not heat it. Stir with the whole is velvety. Strain and set on the fire for a few minutes to heat.


