INFLUENZA VS CASUALTIES

More Deaths from Disease Than All Other Causes in American Forces

Washington, Nov. 18.—The recent epidemic of influenza in the United States caused more deaths than occurred among the American expeditionary forces from all causes from the time the first unit landed in France until hostilities ceased. This announcement yesterday by the census bureau at Washington was based on unofficial estimates of the total casualties among the overseas forces and reports from 46 cities having a combined population of 23,000,000, which showed 82,396 deaths from influenza and pneumonia from September 9 to November 9.

Normally these cities would have had 4000 deaths from these causes during this period, it was said, leaving approximately 78,000 as the number properly chargeable to the epidemic.

"The total casualties in the American expeditionary forces," said the announcement, "have recently been unofficially estimated at 100,000. On the basis of the number thus far reported it may be assumed that the deaths from all causes, including disease and accidents, are probably less than 45 per cent and may not be more than 40 per cent of the total casualties. On this assumption, the loss of life in the American expeditionary forces to date is about 40,000 or 45,000."

WHEAT SUBSTITUTES

Administration to Assist in Disposing of Them.

Montpelier, Vt., Nov. 16.—Federal Food Administration Frank H. Brooks said today that a Washington dispatch has led to confusion in that some were led to believe that the four pound sugar rule was in effect immediately, but only in certain sections of the country. Mr. Brooks explained that certificates on the basis of four pounds per person per month for the household and four pounds per month per 90 meals for hotels and other public eating houses will be issued in Vermont for December requirements. "Strict Allegiance to the three pound rule must be adhered to on the part of all until December 1, 1918," Mr. Brooks said.

Steps are being taken to relieve dealers and merchants who have a large supply of wheat flour substitutes on hand, Mr. Brooks said, now that the substitution rule has been dropped. Where dealers and bakeries have on hand a large supply of substitutes the administration will assist in the disposal of them. When of good quality and passing the prescribed test the Food Administration will undertake to purchase them at a fair price provided the substitutes have not been purchased prior to 60 days before November 15, 1918. Those dealers having a surplus stock should notify administrator Brooks at his office here immediately.



MUSEUM IDEA GROWS

Dr. Day Outlines Further Reasons for Preserving Relics.

Editor of The Banner.—The letter by our famous townsman, Mr. John Spargo, in a recent issue of the Banner, advocating the erection in Bennington of a museum or memorial building in which to place relics, souvenirs, historical documents and the like was very pleasing to me, and will no doubt find a ready and general response among our citizens.

The scheme was long ago suggested and discussed by such men as Governor Hall, General McCollough, Rev. Isaac Jennings, George W. Robinson, Charles M. Bliss, Thomas White, George W. Harman, Col. Olin Scott and others, all of whom are dead, but the matter fell asleep, and now Mr. Spargo has aroused it by a vigorous shake. These men thought the money could be raised if sufficient vim and "pep" were thrown into the canvass for funds for the erection of a modest building at least, but the permanent upkeep of such an institution seemed to be the most perplexing feature in the whole scheme. It was the stumbling block over which the promoters fell. Finally, the fever of impatience to have a building of this kind really visualized to these men slowly abated and the talk ceased.

And now the clever and vigorous pen of Mr. Spargo has revived the subject once more. Such an institution would be one of the show places of Bennington and wherein would be inscribed the local works on the faith, philosophies and creeds, treasured antiquities and interesting collections of many generations. A few years ago a great deal of colonial furniture, relics of nearly all kinds, implements, tools, rare books, portraits of local celebrities and masses of historical documents on old-time events and to a certain extent of manners, customs and dress could have been secured. Some of this has been widely scattered, lost or destroyed, but sufficient remains to make a creditable beginning, and in time it would probably be surprising to see the large amount of collections that people in all parts of the country, especially those having Vermont ancestry, would give the proposed museum.

Bennington is the old mother town of Vermont and has a long and interesting history. It is most that a museum be established here. It would contain nearly all that is absorbingly interesting, strange and antique in our past history, but which the pen now only depicts and perpetuates. May Mr. Spargo be successful in persuading our citizens to take up this matter actively and sincerely enough to push the scheme to completion and really have the Bennington museum visualized to us all in good time.
