

TWO TOWNSHEND MEN

Have Died in France from Bronchial Pneumonia.

Brattleboro, Nov. 20.—The deaths of two Townshend young men in France have just been reported officially to relatives by the war department, both resulting from bronchial pneumonia.

Private Hugh C. Adams died Oct. 21 in Bordeaux. He was a member of Co. G, 301st ammunition train, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Adams. He was 29 years old, a native of West Warshoro, and before being drafted last April lived on his father's farm. Last July he married Miss Irene Potwin, who lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Potwin of Brookline. He went from here to Camp Devens.

Private Lee K. Barrington of Co. E, 302d infantry, died Oct. 22. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin W. Barrington and was born in Jacksonville 24 years ago. Before going to Camp Devens last April, he was employed in a machine shop in Windsor. In a letter to his parents a short time before his death, he wrote that he was in fine physical condition.

DRAFT BOARD RECORDS

Extreme Care for Their Protection is Asked.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Extreme care in protection and completion of all draft board records is asked by Provost-Marshal-General Crowder, in orders sent today to the state draft executives. Local boards are instructed to seal the record which probably will be completed by November thirty and await orders for their final consignment to some central collecting station.

NEXT SUNDAY IS FATHER'S DAY

Dad Will Get the Real News of Son's Great Victory.

Paris, Nov. 19.—The Stars and Stripes, the organ of the American Expeditionary forces, has arranged for Nov. 24 as the day upon which all the American troops shall write home to their fathers. Special delivery arrangements are under way in order that "father's day" shall be as successful as "mother's day." May 12 last, it is hoped that the fathers will write to their sons on the same day.

BURN FRUIT PITS

Unless You Have Carload Lots to Send to Government.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 20.—Saving of fruit pits and nutshells no longer is necessary. The chemical warfare section of the United States army today informed the food administration that the supply of fruit pits and nutshells now on hand is sufficient to meet the requirements for gas masks. Carload shipments of pits and shells however, still are desired, it was said. Collection of less than carload quantities may be used as fuel.
