

HUNGARIAN GOVT FORCED TO RESIGN

It was announced officially. An effort is to be made to double the quota.

GERMAN TROOPS ATTACK AMERICANS

American Red Cross Mission in Kovno, Lithuania, Has Been Attacked—Lithuanian Killed

New York, April 22.—German troops have attacked the American Red Cross Mission at Kovno, Lithuania, according to a cablegram received here yesterday the Lithuanian National Council from its Paris representative. The message gave neither the time nor the result of the attack. A Lithuanian soldier was killed in defending the Americans, it was said. The cablegram read:

"The American Red Cross Mission at Kovno, Lithuania has been attacked by German soldiers. While defending the Americans one Lithuanian soldier was killed in Kovno, and the funeral of the hero developed into a great demonstration against Germans."

No advice of an attack on the mission have been received by Red Cross authorities here. The Kovno unit is a branch of the American Red Cross Mission to Poland. Its personnel is not known here, as the work in Poland and Lithuania was organized in Paris.

Washington, April 21.—A cablegram from Brest to-day to the headquarters here of the 77th division announced the sailing of the vanguard of the famous New York corps which also has many replacements from other states. The message named ships carrying the following units: America sailed April 19, 194th infantry brigade headquarters; 308th infantry completed; 307th infantry headquarters, machine gun company, supply company and companies A, B, C, and E.

Agamemnon sailed April 20, 192nd field artillery brigade complete, 77th division headquarters officers.

St. Louis sailed April 20, 307th infantry, Companies L, K, L, M.

Louisville sailed April 21, 307th infantry, Companies F, G, H, 302nd field signal battalion; 302nd motor ordnance repair shop, 302nd mobile veterinary section; 14th salvage squad—enlistment detach rear echelon.

New Amsterdam sails April 23, 302nd engineers and train.

President Grant sails April 22, 302nd train headquarters and 77th military police company 32nd supply train; 302nd ammunition train, 302nd sanitary train, 304th machine gun battalion, detachment No. 1 motor transport office, Q. M. Rail head detachment.
