### TO BE PUBLICLY HONORED

McIntyre Sisters of Salvation Army to Be Decorated.

Boston, May 14.—The McIntyre sisters, Gladys and Irene, those two heroic Salvation Army lassies who served overseas with the Yankee division, knowing no fear, no sacrifice too great, and braved the hell-swept fire of the front line trenches with the doughboys they administered to, will be publicly honored in this city next Saturday as no women in New England has ever been before.

Major General Clarence R. Edwards the "old man" of the YD, at a military ceremony on the common at 1 o'clock is going to present to the sisters the divisional citations conferred upon them for their noble work with the division in France. The ceremony will be with full military pomp and dignity—troops drawn up in parade with band and colors.

The announcement of the ceremony was made today by General Edwards from his headquarters of the north-eastern department.

"I shall always recall the bright, smiling, courageous faces of the McIntyre sisters," said the general. "Better still, I shall always recall their work among my stout-hearted lads. The devoted and unselfish service of the sisters forms an epoch of the world-war. In presenting them with their citations at a military ceremony on the common I shall not be honoring them so much as I honor myself and my stout-hearted YD lads."

### EXPECTING TROUBLE

So 200 Soldiers Have Been Sent to Windsor, Ont.

Windsor, Ont., May 13.—Approximately 200 soldiers from London, Ont., were quartered at the race track this morning prepared to assist in preserving order when the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg railway at tempted to resume service with strike breakers this forenoon.

The soldiers were summoned late yesterday following disturbances by strikers and sympathizers which the authorities announced they were unable to deal with. The strikers are demanding increased wages and changes in working conditions.

### TO REORGANIZE GUARD

Work, However, Must Await Action by Congress.

Montpelier, May 12.—Adjt.-Gen. H. T. Johnson returned Sunday from St. Louis, Mo., where he attended a conference relative to the reorganization of the National Guard, which will take place as fast as the appropriations permit.

At the present time there is but little money available and just how far Vermont will be able to go in the matter is not yet known, although she will do something along that line. The appropriation for the reorganization of the National Guard was left unappropriated, as were many other appropriations, so that there is a limit to the work that can be done until Congress gets back at work again.

### BATTLEFIELD RELAY RUN

Great Race From Chateau-Thierry to Paris on Memorial Day.

New York, May 13.—The greatest relay race in the history of Europe will be held by 250 picked athletes of the A. E. F. on Memorial Day, according to a cablegram received by William J. Mulligan, Chairman of the K. of C. Committee on War Activities, from Lawrence O. Murray, a Knight of Columbus Overseas Commissioner and former Comptroller of the Currency.

The race will be held from the battlefield of Chateau-Thierry to the Place de la Concorde, Paris, under the auspices of the A. E. F. and the management of the K. of C. The 250 runners are all picked Army men who completed in the recent Rhine relay-marathon from Chelien to Coblenz. They will be divided into teams of twenty men, each team running three miles, thus covering the more than thirty miles from the famous battlefield to the heart of Paris in record time.

The race will be started by Commissioner Murray on the battlefield of Chateau-Thierry by the hoisting of an American flag on the spot where the American marines rushed into the heart of the German advance, and one of the Generals who directed operations there will give a message to the first team to be relayed and delivered to President Wilson and General Pershing.

Thus the symbolism will be carried out of the genuine marathon that might have taken place had the great war been fought in ancient times and a runner sent to warn the French capital of the approach of the invaders.

### \$25,000 BULL CALF

Guernsey Animal Brings Record Price at Auction

Madison, N. J., May 15.—Florham Leader, a two-month-old Guernsey bull calf, was sold at auction here today for \$25,000, said to be a new record price for any animal of its breed. Oaks Farms and Hugh Bancroft, both of Massachusetts, combined to make the purchase, paying \$10,500 above the previous record price.

Florham Leader created interest when he was led into the auction ring. Within two minutes bidding on him had passed the \$10,000 mark. He is a son of Nelplus Ultra, out of Langwater Nancy, a cow that produced 18,783.5 pounds of milk containing 1,001.66 pounds of butter fat in one year, a record that has been exceeded by only three Guernsey cows it was announced before the sale.

The auction today, which was at Florham farms, resulted in the transfer of 83 Guernseys including show champions and the highest producing blood lines of the breed. It was said, for a total of \$180,275, an average of approximately \$2,172 a head.


Canton Vinton Wins Competitive Drill at Annual Convention of Odd Fellows.




