but it is not entirely separated from the main room and is hardly adequate for expanding needs. The simple fact is, Bennington has outgrown its library quarters. There are times when the state of congestion is not easy to handle. And yet fine order is kept.

The librarian very much needs extra assistance. We should have a regularly appointed assistant librarian, and not be dependent upon service engaged for occasional hours. But that raises the problem of finance.

The town at its annual meeting for some years past has made small increases in the appropriation for the library, and has shown a generous disposition, but we are still running very close to the wind. The Board of Managers would like to do more if they were able to command the means.

We are looking forward to the day when we shall have a new library building, beautiful commodious, finely equipped, and sufficient in every way for the increasing intellectual needs of this community.
