VETERAN ENGINEER DEAD

Patrick Skane, Forty Years With Boston and Maine Road.

Troy, Oct. 6.—In the death of Patrick Skane which occurred Tuesday morning at his home in Johnsonville, after an illness of several weeks, this section lost one of its best known veteran railroad men, as for more than forty years Mr. Skane had been engaged in the service of the Boston and Maine and its predecessors, the Fitchburg company and the old Troy and Boston. Up to the time of his retirement from active service about eleven years ago, Mr. Skane resided in Troy, and is very well known here. For a great many years he was in charge of local freight train No. 210, and was known to nearly every man, woman and child between Troy and North Bennington, the terminals of his run. Upon being retired and pensioned by the Boston and Maine company eleven years ago in recognition of his long and faithful service, Mr. Skane decided to spend the remainder of his days on a small farm and first went to Melrose, where he remained eight years and then took up residence in the old Gow homestead at Johnsonville.

Mr. Skane was a native of the village of Northfield, Vt., though his boyhood days were spent for the most part on a farm not far from Winooski, Vt. Early in life he became a railroader on the Troy and Boston, first taking a position in the passenger service and later being given charge of train 210, which he ran continuously up to the time of his retirement. Mr. Skane was looked upon as a thorough railroader and was one whose advice was frequently sought by officials of the road. Back in the days when long hours made railroading a hard job, Mr. Skane experienced hardships such as few men of his time were called upon to endure and frequently recalled one experience in the dead of a bitter cold winter. With a great shortage of men and a great amount of freight to move he made three consecutive trips out of Troy, these being divided by only a half hour in which to have his dinner pail refilled. At the end of the third trip he had finished a "trick of duty" of almost 45 consecutive hours. The pay for that work was about one-third the present pay drawn by railroad men. In the railroad service Conductor Skane formed and followed this creed and insisted that all others under him do likewise: "Obey orders; do your work no matter how long it takes; be willing to accommodate; don't drink and do your sleeping when off duty." Living up to that creed largely accounts for the success which was his to enjoy while "on the road."

Since his retirement Mr. Skane took up farming on a small acre and came to be recognized as an expert in agricultural work. His gardens at Melrose and Johnsonville were models of perfection and made so through his relentless warfare on weeds.

The deceased was a member of St. Monica's Church of Johnsonville. He was also a member of the local branch of the Order of Railway Conductors, the New York and New England Association of Veteran Railroad Employees and of Hinn Tent, Knights of the Macabees of Troy. His was always a cheery disposition and he was never more happy than when he could aid others. To the men on the railroad he was known as "Father" Skane and every day as scores of trains passed his home it was customary for the men on them to shout a word of greeting to the familiar figure of their former fellow employee. These greetings were always cheerfully responded to by the veteran railroader.
