### CLAIMS OF 800 VERMONT EX-SOLDIERS ADJUSTED

Veterans' Bureau Clean up Squad Spent 41 Days in State and Visited 20 Towns

Boston, Dec. 6.—More than 800 Vermont disabled ex-service men were assisted with their claims against the government during the Clean Up campaign recently completed in that state by the Clean Up squad from the Boston office of the United States Veterans' Bureau.

The Clean Up Squad toured the state for nearly two months, visiting 29 towns which previously had been selected as centers for the disabled veterans of the locality to assemble. Veterans in each community were informed of the appearance of the Clean Up squad by the American Legion and the Red Cross, through the press and clergy, by motion picture slides and personal letters. An effort was made to reach not only the disabled veterans whose claims were pending but also disabled ex-service men who had never filed claims and were ignorant of their rights under the War Risk Act.

The Clean Up campaign was designed to eliminate all unnecessary delay in adjusting the claims of disabled veterans by bringing the government direct to them and it is evident that this object was accomplished in Vermont.

Every veteran in the state who had a possible disability claim against the government, or whose claim had been adjusted to his dissatisfaction or who wished any information in regard to compensation, vocational training, medical treatment or government insurance was urged to appear before the Clean Up squad when it appeared in his locality. As a result many potential claimants whose cases were unknown both to the American Legion and the Red Cross were found and assisted.

The Clean Up squad visited the county fairs of nine towns, erecting a tent on the midway and serving many veterans from isolated districts who perhaps could never have been reached personally in any other manner.

Arrangements for the Clean Up squad to visit every locality were made by an advance representative of the Veterans' Bureau who obtained through the co-operation of the Red Cross and American Legion the approximate number of claimants expected to appear before the squad and the accessibility of surrounding towns. Headquarters of the Clean Up squad were chosen in advance as advisable to work evenings in order to accommodate disabled veterans who find it impossible to appear during the day.

The Clean Up squad was composed of two medical examiners, a compensation expert and insurance expert, together with local representatives of the Red Cross and the Veterans organizations. Disabled men were assisted in all matters which formerly came under the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, the Federal Board for Vocational Education and the United States Public Health Service before the merging of these organizations into the Veterans Bureau.

Personal contact with the disabled veterans of Vermont has been accomplished. At this date the majority of the claims of Vermont disabled veterans have been adjusted or are in the period of adjudication.
