#### VERMONT HAS EXHIBIT.

Green Mountain State Represented in Travel Exposition in New York.

Burlington, March 28—Vermont is the only state in the Union thus far to fix up an exhibit in the International Travel Exposition which opened in the Grand Central Palace, 47th st. and Lexington avenue, New York city, Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, according to Walter H. Crockett, of the state publicity department, who returned from New York Sunday night. Mr. Crockett went to New York for the purpose of supervising the arrangement of the Vermont exhibit, which will be in charge of Miss H. A. Quimby, who conducts the Averil camps during the summer and is in New York this winter. M. J. Corliss, secretary of the Vermont Maple Sugar Makers' association, is in charge of the Vermont maple products exhibit, with G. B. Fish of Stockbridge as his assistant.

This is the first exposition of this nature ever held, at least in this section of the country, and it has started out very auspiciously, according to Mr. Crockett. Even on the first afternoon the Vermont booth proved a center of attraction, a large number of people gathering there to ask questions about the Green Mountain State and to get some of the literature which the State publicity department has for distribution. Many people said that they were interested in Vermont as a vacation land and hoped to come here this summer, either on tour or to spend their vacation on some one of the numerous lakes.

Besides the maple sugar exhibit and the literature which is being circulated both on the part of the State and on the part of towns, communities and hotels and organizations, there are many attractive framed photographs of some of Vermont's best scenery. Evergreen is used for decorations.

The travel exposition will last a week. During that time a concerted effort will be made to create a new interest in travel, both in this and in foreign countries. Among the countries which have attractive exhibits which has several buildings in which will be found statues and paintings. France, Czechoslovakia, Iceland, Russia and China also have exhibits. Most of the steamship companies are represented with attractive exhibits, including large models of steamships and their fittings.

#### VERMONT NEWS

##### Happenings in the State That Are Worth Reading.

The smallest number of industrial accident reports for one month in the records of the commissioner of industries' office, in the state house, with one exception, was filed during February, 1922. The month of May 1921, with 463 reports showed one less accident than February, 1922, when 464 were reported. An industrial report from Ohio received in Montpelier states that the number of claims filed with the state industrial commissioner there during February was the smallest for one month in several years.

The tiny son of Mr. and Mrs. James Logan of St. Johnsbury, weighs three and three-quarters pounds at the end of the first three weeks of his life. He is being cared for at Brightlook hospital, St. Johnsbury. For many days the baby was fed with a medicine dropper, but now he has advanced to a small bottle.

State Fish and Game Commissioner H. P. Sheldon, of Montpelier, is the author of an article on "The Sportsman's Punch," which appears in the April issue of Field and Stream. The article deals with game conservation policies and co-operation between the state fish and game department and the sportsman.

The flying squadron of department officers of the American Legion have accepted the invitation of Montpelier Post No. 3 to attend a joint smoker for Washington county legionaires to be held in the post rooms at Montpelier April 13.

Eddie Duval of Salem-Derby secured an animal with his rifle one day last week, which he exhibited in New port, and which so far has not been identified. At first sight it appeared to be a fox and resembled that animal in size and had a bushy tail like a fox. Its ears and nose were much shorter than a fox, its head being more like a coon.
