BREAKS BUILDING RECORD

Chicago Permits for Structures in 1922 Worth \$217,434,960.

Chicago, Dec. 29.—Chicago has made a new building construction mark this year. December, which usually sees a lull in applications for new permits, will be the biggest building month in the history of the city, according to present estimates.

With four business days lacking, the value of buildings for which permits were issued this year was \$217,434,960. The value of the buildings for which permits were issued in 1921 was \$125,004,510. The greatest valuation of new buildings permitted before that time was in 1915, when the total was \$112,635,150.

The number of permits issued this year was 12,467. The previous record was set in 1912 with 11,325.

The frontage of buildings permitted this year was 400,000 square feet, or eighty miles; the buildings were constructed side by side. The total frontage for 1921 was 234,945 feet.

R. W. BLYTH DIES AT 88

Veteran Reporter Told Ericsson of Victory of the Monitor

Robert Blyth, veteran newspaper man and former chief clerk of the Weighers' Bureau of the Customs Service, died on Tuesday at the home of his daughter in Haworth, N. J. He was in his eighty-ninth year. In his youth Mr. Blyth joined the New York Herald and as reporter gave Ericsson the first news of the victory of the Monitor over the Merrimack.

When the Great Eastern arrived from England June 28, 1860, Blyth "covered" the event for the Herald, and twelve years later he wrote for the same paper the account of Stanley's return from Africa. He attended the blessing of the ground for St. Patrick's Cathedral, making the trip to Fifth Street and Fifth Avenue by horsecar to the limit at Third Street and Third Avenue, walking the rest of the way. "What are they blessing a cathedral out in the woods for?" was the comment of a fellow-reporter.

Blyth was born in Cavan, Ireland, went to school for a time in Canada and then returned to Ireland, coming here permanently in 1851. Services will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon in All Saints Church, Brooklyn.

BOULDER'S HALF BILLION.

Legacy for Use by Local Institutions Not Available for 300 Years.

Boulder, Colo., is to enjoy great wealth. A sum of something over half a billion dollars is to be made available for use by local institutions. The donor has recently deposited the nucleus of the fund in a local bank.

Before paying Mr. Rockefeller or his rival, Mr. Ford, it is well to note that the kind-hearted citizen has deposited only "several hundred dollars." This sum is to be held in trust for 300 years, at which time it will have passed the half billion mark all because of interest compounded annually.

When the time limit has expired, \$20,000 of the money is to provide for certain charitable institutions, \$10,000 is to go for maintenance of a symphony orchestra, and so on. The trustees are to elect their own successors, and so keep a continuous body of custodians of the fund.

Of course, if one aspires to leave half a billion to one's favorite town and has on hand only hundreds or thousands, this extended trust system is the best way to accomplish the feat. It is hardly likely, however, that any live town like Boulder would be willing to sit back and wait 200 years before putting its charitable institutions on their feet or establishing a symphony orchestra. A donation of several hundred dollars, available immediately, to community fund, art museum or other recognized public cause would be of more practical good.


