SISTER OF HICHBORN DANGEROUSLY ILL

BOSTON, MASS.—Special.—The body of Philip Highborn, the Washington attorney, who was driven to suicide by his wife's elopement with Horace Wylie, was brought to Boston today from Washington. The train also brought Mrs. Highborn, his mother, and Captain P. H. Pearsall, U. S. N., his brother-in-law, at whose home Highborn shot himself. In a heavy rainstorm the party was driven to a downtown hotel, while the body was taken to Mount Auburn Cemetery.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Special.—The Herald today prints the following: Dangerously ill from grief and shock, Mrs. Paul S. Pearsall, who discovered the body of her brother, Philip S. Highborn, in the library of her home, 1501 Eighteenth Street northwest, after he had committed suicide with a revolver while supposedly mentally unbalanced from the sorrow and humiliation caused by the elopement of his wife with Horace Wylie, was unable to witness the church rites over the body yesterday afternoon, and is in bed at her residence under the care of physicians.

Fear is felt by relatives and friends that Mrs. Pearsall will be unable to stand the strain, and a report from New York city that a sister of her husband died in the metropolis at almost the exact minute that Philip Highborn committed suicide is being kept from her by order of physicians, who, it is believed, are afraid that another shock may cause Mrs. Pearsall to lose her reason.

Mother Grief Stricken. Mrs. Philip Highborn, widow of the late Rear Admiral Highborn, and mother of the young lawyer who has sensationally ended his earthly troubles, also was unable to be present at the funeral services for her son, but she recovered sufficiently after the ceremony to board a train for Boston, where the body will be interred today. Friends of the grief-stricken woman used every influence to persuade her from taking the trip because of her condition.

Paul S. Pearsall, brother-in-law of Philip Highborn, also accompanied the body, and after attending the services for the suicide, he will at once board a train for New York city in order to be present at the funeral of his sister. While the report that Pearsall's sister is dead seems well founded, no relative or friend in this city has been found who would verify the report. It is stated on good authority that Pearsall received a long-distance telephone call, advising him of the demise of his sister just after he entered his home and was told Highborn had committed suicide.

Another report current last night and apparently well founded, but not verified, was that Mrs. Henry M. Hoyt, widow of the late Solicitor General of the State Department and mother of Mrs. Elinore Hoyt Highborn, left her home, 1701 Rhode Island Avenue northwest, two weeks ago for Nice, Italy, where, report says, Mrs. Highborn had just borne a child. Henry M. Hoyt, the young brother of Mrs. Highborn, would neither affirm nor deny the report that his mother had departed for Nice.

When Hoyt was asked by reporters whether he had anything to say on the subject, he answered politely: "No. What can any one expect me to say. I wish only to ask that no questions be asked me." His request was granted and the reporters asked no questions. Friends say the grief of young Hoyt is pitiful.
