

FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.

Wheat Culture. At a subsequent meeting Mr. Holt, of New Market said: I once bought a tract of twenty-two acres, in the edge of Durham, for \$1,200, and told the farmers I was going to raise wheat. They laughed at me, and said they couldn't raise wheat. I asked them, "If you put into the soil what will make wheat and make straw, can't you get wheat?" They said, "Yes; if you know what it is." I had a soap factory and told them I was going to try an abundance of leached ashes. I plowed the land, sowed wheat, and had a splendid crop. The next spring the farmers all around me wanted to buy seed wheat, and I had a good chance to sell my wheat and my ashes, too, and the farmers all around there raised wheat that year, and have raised it ever since, clear up into Nottingham, and in other towns where they did not think of raising wheat before that.

The first year after I bought the land, I cut only seven tons of hay on the twenty-two acres. It had not been for the marks of the cogs in the wheels of the mowing-machine, it would have been difficult for me to tell where to drive when I came around—the grass was so thin to show where the machine had gone. After I raised the wheat, the grass came up, and I cut two tons to the acre and more. I am satisfied that my operations on that field were the best investment I ever made. I have bought fifty acres more, and intend to make a garden of the whole of it. I am satisfied that farming pays me; it is the best business I ever got into.

Feeding Dairy Cows.

Dairy cows should have daily access to salt, and it should be placed where they can get at it whenever their appetite craves for it. The most convenient plan is to place the salt in troughs in the shed, or in the open yard. Cattle soon regulate their appetite, taking no more than they naturally require, when they are allowed to have free access to salt. It is the practice with some farmers to only salt their stock at intervals of a week or more, and when they do it they throw the salt out in the field indiscriminately; this practice of salting is injurious to the cows, for the reason that they are very often liable to overfeed themselves; with it, causing scouring and a general derangement of health. Then, again, the stronger animals will get the larger share, and thus become injured by overfeeding, while the weaker animals are deprived from getting what they really need. For milch cows, salt is almost a necessity; it adds to their flow of milk, and is also an important element in the blood. Experience has proved that cows in milk require salt, and that they should at all times have free access to it. There is a greater necessity for the use of salt in the spring than at any other time of the year, for it is at this time that the feed is in a measure deficient in saline matter, and does not furnish sufficient for a large quantity of milk. It has been found from experience that it is chiefly from this cause that cows require much less salt in winter than in the summer season.

Charcoal for Hogs.

As this is about the time to pen fattening hogs, we will repeat the advice given about a year ago in this paper. Sometimes extremely valuable advice is found in a very limited space, and this is one of those cases. Get dry charcoal and place it in one corner of the pen, so that the hogs can have access to it ad libitum. If this is not done, the corn, especially new corn, will become acid in the stomach, and the hog seeks the soft, weatherbeaten part of fence rails, clay, dirt—in short, anything that will absorb the acid. These things injure the animal, by irritating the stomach and bowels, and causing indigestion, which is the very thing the charcoal cures. There need be no concern about the quantity of charcoal the hogs may eat, for when its remedial powers cease, it fattens the animal directly. Every farmer has observed, when the hogs are butchered, small boils, blisters, &c. on the liver. These are never seen, if the charcoal is given in time. Our faith goes even farther; we believe it is a remedy against skippers, to a great extent. Skippers are sometimes bred in the meat, and in cases where this would have occurred, we believe the charcoal has prevented it. Owing to the good health of the hog by the use of charcoal, it eats more, and consequently more bacon is put in the meat-house from a given number of hogs.

Cheap Portable Fence.

Take a full fence, four pieces of boards six inches wide and sixteen feet in length. To these put on three cleats one at each end and one in the middle, dailed with either hammered or with good eight-penny cut nails and nailed, or at least those that will clinch good. These will make panels easily banded, and when set up in the desired place, let each alternate panel have cleats face in opposite directions. The ends of the boards would but up to the cleat on the other; the boards in this little space are double. A pair of stakes are then to be driven into

the ground, the top boards resting on the stakes where they intersect; they also rest on the top edge of the second boards from the top. In this way the stakes serve as a vice to hold the whole together. The stakes can stand straight enough, so that but little ground will be lost from cultivation."
