Renewing Old Fruit Trees.

A great many old fruit-trees would produce bountiful crops of good fruit if they were occasionally pruned a little, the moss removed from the bodies, and the soil renewed around them. This can be done in mild winter weather, or quite as well after the growing season has commenced. After the soil around fruit trees has yielded up a large proportion of its available fertility, unless it is renewed, paying crops of fair fruit cannot be expected. Fruit trees can be renovated in the winter, as well as at any other season of the year. If the soil where the trees stand is heavy, it will pay to draw a load of two of manure leaf-mould, loam or sand, and spread around each one, as far as the lateral branches extend. On the contrary, if the ground is light and porous, it will pay to haul clay the distance of a mile or more, to spread about fruit-trees, which can be done on sleighs as well as on wagons or carts. If leached ashes can be obtained at the expense of carting, or hauling on sleighs, three or four miles, it will pay well to collect large quantities and spread them around fruit trees of any kind. Unleached ashes are superior to leached for such purposes; yet, when these cannot be procured, leached will be found of great value. There is no danger of applying too large a quantity, although five to ten bushels spread around each large fruit tree will constitute a liberal dressing. One or two bushels spread around a small tree will be sufficient for one dressing. Cherry trees, plum trees and pear trees, which bear knotty, scabby and rough fruit, need lime and ashes, which will enable the trees to produce crops smooth and beautiful. Hence, pile on lime and ashes around fruit trees.

Poison by Ivy—Remedy.—Among all the remedies proposed for the "Poison Ivy," which in this State is called "Poison Oak," I have just seen one that is certainly very simple and very effective. The poison acts very differently upon some persons from what it does upon others. Some people are entirely proof against its effect, and can, with impunity, rub it on without any ill effect. Others are poisoned by simple contact with clothing that has touched it. Its common effect is to produce intense itching. Common salt rubbed on wet, relieves the itching, and speedily cures the poison, and for that reason, it is best applied in that way in most cases but when the itching can be borne, a banana wet in salt water will be most effective. The simplicity and effectiveness of this remedy ought to be generally communicated, and I hope you will present it to your readers.—W. Porter, Charlottesville, Va.

Since then in his own practice, he has frequently employed oil of peppermint as a local anesthetic, not only in neuralgia, but also in gout, with remarkably good results. He has found the relief from pain to be almost instantaneous."

AN EVERY YEAR BEARING APPLE TREE.—There is said to be in Orange county, New York, an apple tree of the above character. The cause of its producing equally every year is thought to be in its having been grafted one side at a time, two consecutive years. The facts are, the first grafted had fruit first; other side a year after; and they have now taken regular turns at fruit-bearing a full third of a century.—Ex.

SWEET POTATO VINE.—A lady florist says to grow a pretty vine from the sweet potato, put a tuber in pure sand or sandy loam, in a hanging basket, and water occasionally. It will throw out tendrils and beautiful leaves, and will climb freely over the arms of the basket and upward to the top of the window. No one visitor in a hundred will know it, but will suppose it to be some rare foreign plant.

If you want to have good gardens in the spring, manure heavily four or five inches thick with well-rotted manure. Spade up deeply, and loosen the ground still deeper with a pick.

Lime is highly recommended for the roots of fruit trees.
