EIGHT TO ONE IN FRIDAY'S BASE BALL GAME AT NEW BERN.

The features of the game were the stick work of Epstein for Goldsboro and Simpson for New Bern and the fielding of Jeannette and Edwards for Goldsboro.

This is the third game which our boys have played, losing one of them to Shag Thompson's Pikeville team.

THE AFFINITIES

The plot of the play is intensely interesting, full of atmosphere and action. The next scene is laid in a Western town, where the Thurstons and Marjorie Astorbilt, Peggy's friend, have come as a subterfuge. Here are brought in some of the best characters of the play, namely, Indiana Roland, a big-hearted Western girl, Pete Roland, an inn-keeper, Dave Stephens a cowboy; Mr. and Mrs. Miles Somers, a young married couple, and Mrs. Oliver Van Durlee, a suffragette leader, and the real action of the play takes place, keeping the audience on the quiver of what will happen next, leading up to one grand climax, when every one finds his "affinity."

The young people for the choruses have been carefully selected, as the chorus parts are as important as the speaking parts.

One special number will be the dance "Texas Tommy Swing" by the Western girls and cowboys, this being very difficult and most attractive. Perhaps one of the prettiest numbers will be the dance of the "Blue Birds" in which the little tots take part.
