Communications have reached the State Department urging this government to stop or do something that will put a stop to the atrocities in Turkey. It is said that this pressure does not emanate from the missionaries.

Officials of the State Department are re-enthusiastic about the probability of the United States giving expression to the feeling with which the alleged atrocities in Turkey are viewed by the people of the United States, but they say that reports from Turkey show that the deeds daily perpetrated in sections of that country are of such a character as to shock civilization and necessitate a more deep concern to the United States.

MUCH UNFAVORABLE COMMENT. Constantinople, September 21.-The unfavorable comment aroused by the appointing of Reshid Pasha, the former Vali of Beirut, to be Vali of Bruss, which is really a promotion, continues. The action of the Porte in this connection is regarded here as a challenge to the representatives of the powers, especially to the American minister, who, it is thought, is likely to protest and may possibly demand Reshid Pasha's recall from Bruss, in the interests of the American educational establishment in that vilayet.

Reports from Beirut say the appointment of Halli Pasha to be Vali of Beirut has caused much disappointment. The inhabitants expected that Nazim Pasha, the Vali of Syria, who inspired confidence by his conduct when he became Vali after Reshid Pasha's removal, would be made Vali.

A special dispatch from Rila gives the following details of the fighting at Perin: "On the 16th of September, 1,000 Turkish troops surrounded the village and attacked the bands under Steinfold and Devinsgoff, who had taken up a position there. The latter were reinforced by bands commanded by Yancoff and Zontchen, and the combined insurgent forces turned on the Turks and completely annihilated them. One Turkish commander was captured."

Washington, Sept. 21.-The State Department today received a long cablegram from Minister Leishman, at Constantinople, but nothing was given out regarding it except the informal statement that it contained no alarming news, and was in part concerned with routine business.

Washington, Sept. 21.-The body of Orlando P. Dexter, a New York millionaire, who was assassinated near his summer home in the Adirondacks near Saute Clara, N. Y., on Saturday, arrived here today in the care of John P. Badger, Dexter's attorney, and G. H. Nicholson, an undertaker. Badger says the crime was well planned and had created an immense sensation in the Adirondacks where the rich land owners have many foes.

William Rockefeller is said also to be in peril of his life. The father of Dexter offers \$50,000 reward for the arrest of the assassin.

PROVISIONS OF BARKSDALE BILL.

Should Be Carefully Studied By All Candidates.

THEY CANNOT USE MONEY.

Traps May Be Set to Catch the Unwary.

They Should be on the Guard.

Extracts from the statute read as follows: An act to promote pure elections, primaries and conventions, and to prevent corrupt practices or bribery in same; to limit the expenses of candidates, to prescribe the duties of candidates, and providing penalties and remedies for violations of this act, and declaring void under certain conditions elections in which the provisions of this act, or any of them, have been violated.

APPLIES TO ALL.

Section 3. Every person who shall be a candidate before any caucus or convention, or at any primary election or at any election for any State, county, city, township, district or municipal office, or for Senator or member of the House of Delegates of Virginia, or for Senator or Representative in the Congress of the United States, shall, within thirty days after the election, caucus, convention or primary election held to fill such office or place, make out and file with the officer or board empowered by law to issue certificates of election to such office or place, and a duplicate thereof with the clerk of the County or Corporation Court for any county or city in which such candidate resides, a statement in writing, which statement and duplicate shall be subscribed and sworn to by such candidate before an officer authorized to administer oaths, setting forth in detail all sums of money contributed, disbursed, expended or promised by him, and to the best of his knowledge and belief by any persons or person in his behalf, wholly or in part, endeavoring to secure his nomination or election to such office or place; and also all sums of money contributed, disbursed, expended or promised by him in support and in connection with the nomination or election of any other persons at such election, primary or nominating convention, and showing the dates when, the persons to whom and the purposes for which all sums were paid, expended or promised. Such statement shall also set forth that the same is as full and explicit as alicant is able to make it; and he shall also, before some officer qualified to administer oaths, take, subscribe and file with said statement the following oath:

DRASEIC OATH. I do solemnly swear that the statement herewith filed embraces all money spent by me or in my behalf, with my knowledge and consent, by my adherents and friends; that I have neither directly nor indirectly arranged, encouraged nor connived at the spending of any money other than as shown in my said statement; that I have not repaid any money so spent or claimed to have been so spent, and that I will not do so, and that I have not violated any of the provisions of this act in letter or in spirit. So help me, God.

Section 4. No officer or board authorized by law to issue certificates or certificates of election shall issue any such certificate or commission to any such person until such statement and oath shall have been so made, verified and filed by such person with said officer.

Section 5. Any person failing to comply with the above provisions by failing to file said statement and oath in the manner and form above prescribed shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$5,000, to be recovered in an action or motion brought in the name of the State by the Attorney-General or by the Commonwealth's Attorney of the county or city of the candidate's residence, or by any person suing in the name of the Commonwealth, the amount of said fine to be fixed within the above limit by the jury, and to be paid into the school fund in said county.

Section 6. No person shall enter upon the duties of any elective office until he shall have filed the statement, oath and duplicate provided for in this act, nor shall he receive any salary or any emolument for any period prior to the filing of the same.

NO REQUEST FROM COLOMBIA

To Extend the Time for the Ratification of the Treaty.

Washington, September 21.-Within one day of the expiration of the time limit for the exchange of ratifications of the Hay-Perran Panama canal treaty, the State Department is still without any request from the Colombia government for the extension of this period.

At the State Department today the canal situation was said to be in the same hopeless state as described in the telegram of Minister Berup received Saturday. Acting Secretary of State Ailes today asserted very positively that no new proposition has reached Washington from Bogota. The communication which Dr. Herran, the Colombian charge, recently submitted to the State Department was to the effect that the Boto government desired to continue canal negotiations in case the present pending treaty failed of ratification.

The State Department has not replied to this representation.

Concert a Success.

The first concert of the Tazewell Choral and Orchestra Association was given in the hall of the High School on Tuesday night, the 22nd inst. A large and fashionable audience was present to enjoy this first public effort of "home talent," and it was for the audience a most enjoyable occasion. The programme consisted of 12 numbers, 10 of which were rendered by the orchestra, the other two numbers being vocal solos rendered by Miss Charlotte Henry.

Most of the numbers played by the orchestra were admirably done, especially "Le Calif de Bagdad," Fantasia "Bohemian Girl" and the Overture, "Zampa." These numbers were executed with a smoothness that was truly remarkable, when it is remembered that the orchestra is composed of amateurs and that it has been organized and practicing for only three months.
