WHY NOT REPUBLICAN SUCCESS?

The Democratic newspapers have been discussing the probability and possibility of Republican success in Virginia at the coming State election.

Not until the Republicans in Virginia declare their independence and cease to be essentially the administration party will they ever seriously menace Democratic supremacy in the State.

Our Richmond contemporary thus treats the matter of the Republican outlook in Virginia in a serious way. However, it is measurably mistaken both in its premises and conclusions.

In a forecast of the proceedings of the Ohio Democratic convention, which met at Columbus yesterday, a correspondent of the Washington Post said:

form, and while Roosevelt may not be commended, there is a strong sentiment for him. When the convention actually met, Temporary Chairman Daugherty declared that "popular favor was never so showered upon President Roosevelt as it is, when he is sowing the Democratic seed in Democratic soil, prepared for him by Democratic hands."

What a wonderful effect has been produced by the unmerciful licking Mr. Roosevelt gave the Democracy in 1904. That effect is notably strong and gushing at the South, as witness the above from the Richmond Times Dispatch.

Last year, according to Democratic assertion, Mr. Roosevelt was a dangerous man, totally unfit to manage the affairs of this great Nation. He was declared to be a crank, a friend of the trusts and an extreme advocate of social equality.

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The different kinds of Democrats who make up what there is of the party in the several States appear to have divided the results in the Ohio convention this week. It is rather a curious mixture, all in all.

Causes of the Increase in Suicide

Ill-health is becoming more and more the reason given by many who commit suicide. Last week a well-to-do woman, suffering from "nervous dyspepsia," a shameless term of the laity as well as of professional writers, eluded her two nurses, and killed herself in a fit of despondency over her disease.

It is to be hoped that the matter will be taken up by the Richmond grand jury. The law in question was passed for the purpose of preventing just such grafting operations as have been brought to light in the State Board of Education and now is the time to show that no grafter will receive consideration under that act.

There is one peculiar thing about dogs, remarked a well-known local fancier and huntsman, "and that is, you never saw one pant and wag his tail at the same time. A dog is not capable of a double emotion. He can't growl and wag his tail at the same time, for it is impossible for him to be mad at one end and glad at the other."

At present what President Roosevelt says is perfectly true, the average man is better paid in our institutions of learning than are men of like rank abroad. Men of the first rank are worse paid. The emoluments and earnings of a scholar of the very first reputation in Germany, France and England are from two to four times those open to a scholar of the first rank here.

Buildings and laboratories are well enough. They multiply. Men are more. They exist where great prizes are offered for them and President Roosevelt probes the center of the weakness of our universities in urging that great prizes for great scholars be offered here. Instead, our university management too often puts thousands and thousands of dollars into buildings and pares professors' salaries to the starvation point.

The conservative view of the business is to have its day long delayed, too; and companies that have kept out of the mad race are going to be benefited outwardly and openly by the wisdom of their management. The negative benefit of not getting into trouble does not appear until the trouble comes; then it emphasizes the positive benefit of a wise and safe course.

The worst thing about the Equitable revelations has been the uncovering of the piratical and unprincipled greed of men high in social position, who have not hesitated to flinch by wholesale the savings of the frugal poor that chose the Equitable largely because of the figure-head directors. Those men have shown such a naked disregard of the common laws of honest conduct as to shake confidence.

Paul Kester, the novelist and playwright, with his family, will go to England on July 10, to take up his residence at Angli Castle, which he recently purchased. He may live in England permanently, and is making preparations to continue his literary work abroad.

Frederick Law Olmstead, of New York, has been invited by the Yale Corporation to become the landscape architect for the extensive Hillhouse property, which on August 1 will pass to the corporation, and which will be developed as a park and botanical garden in connection with the Yale Forest School.

RAILROADS IN ABYSSINIA.

England and France Planning Lines to Further Their Commercial Interests. At the end of December there took place, in Paris, a general meeting of the International Ethiopian Railway Trust and Construction company, at which were present the directors of the French Jibuti and Harrar Railway company.

The French company was originally formed to construct a line from Jibuti to Harrar, with prolongation to Addis Ababa, the capital of Abyssinia, conditional on the consent of Menelik. The French government votes a subsidy of 500,000 francs annually; but the French investor was still under the influence of the Panama catastrophe, and refused to come forward with the capital required.
