

GRADING AND MACADAMIZING--NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Sealed bids will be received at the office of the clerk of Tazewell county, at Tazewell, Va., up to noon Saturday, November 4th, 1911, for the grading and macadamizing of the following sections of road in Maiden Spring Magisterial District of Tazewell county:

First. Section No. 1, beginning at a point in the Fincastle and Cumberland Gap turnpike, on the line between the counties of Tazewell and Russell; thence eastward over said turnpike for a distance of one mile.

Second. Section No. 2, beginning at a point in the road leading from Cedar Bluff to the Fincastle and Cumberland Gap turnpike. Said point is situated about one-quarter of a mile northward from said turnpike; thence southward along said road to said turnpike; thence eastward with said turnpike a distance of about three-quarters of a mile, making about one mile in the section, possibly more or less. The lengths of this section depends upon the money in our hands to be expended. In other words if the money is exhausted before the mile is completed the contractor will be required to stop, if it is not all expended when the mile is completed he will be required to continue until it is expended. Said sections are about one-half a mile apart. Each bid must include both sections. The macadam on both of said sections of road to be of an average width of 12 feet. The road to be built on the same plans and specifications as those prescribed by the State Highway Commission. Said plans and specifications can be seen at the office of the clerk of Tazewell county at Tazewell, Va.

A certified check must accompany each bid, payable to the treasurer of Tazewell county, for a sum equal to two per cent of the amount bid, which will be required as an evidence of good faith on the part of the bidder.

The right is reserved to reject any or all bids. The successful bidder will be required to give bond in the amount of thirty-three and one-third (33 1/3) per cent of face of contract.
