When next pension day comes around there will be some disagreeably surprised men, among those who will apply for their checks at several Pension agencies throughout the country. The failure to receive the customary check will be the first notice these men will have that they have been dropped from the pension roll as a result of the examination now being conducted by a select committee of examiners, all of the pensions granted under Raun's construction of the act of 1890. Although this work has just commenced many names have already been dropped and many will follow. The men who are being dropped by this committee are not strictly speaking fraudulent pensioners, although they have drawn public money to which they were not entitled. The wrong was committed by Raun in so constructing the law as to make them eligible for pensions, and for that reason it is not probable that any attempt will be made to recover the money already paid to those who have been or will be dropped, as will be done in cases where the pensioner got on the roll by fraudulent acts of his own.

Colonel Ainsworth Denounced and Publicly Threatened.

Almost A Riot Growing out of the Washington Horror

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 12—There was a startling and sensational scene at the inquest in the Ford's Theater disaster today. Charles E. Banes denounced Colonel Ainsworth as intimidating witnesses, and immediately there was a most threatening demonstration against the Colonel. The testimony was proceeding quietly, when the dramatic scene occurred suddenly and without warning.

Mr. Banes walked forward, and when close to Colonel Ainsworth shook his fist in his face, and in a voice trembling with passion cried out: "You murdered my brother and you have no right to sit here and intimidate witnesses." There was a dead pause. Then Mr. Warner one of the jurors, said that owing to the evident feeling displayed he thought it only right that any one who might be implicated in this matter should be asked to withdraw.

Intense excitement followed. Mr. Perry counsel for Colonel Ainsworth, got on his feet, but howls and shouts from all sides drowned his voice. In vain he appealed to be heard.

Excited men were shaking their fists and cries of "murderer" filled the air. Mr. Warner jumped on a chair and appealed for quiet and. One man yelled "Kill him!" another "Hang him!" and a general movement was made toward Colonel Ainsworth, who remained calm but pale.

Mr. Warner, standing on the chair, appealed again and again for yeace while Lieutenant Amiss of the police force took his station by Colonel Ainsworth's chair. One excited man jumped in front of the Coroner and yelled: "There will be no peace until Ainsworth is put under arrest and is held without bail."

Finally Mr. Warren made himself heard and succeeded in quieting the storm, which threatened another chapter to the horror, and Coroner Schaeffer immediately adjourned the hearing until to-morrow.

As soon as the inquest adjourned Colonel Ainsworth went out and got into a carriage and drove away. He was followed by angry cries and imprecations.—*Republic.*

Colonel Ainsworth is the guardian of the records of the soldiers of the rebellion and has prevented the pension sharks from getting possession of them and in that way spoiled many a fat scheme not only to rob the Government; but honest pensioners, and it was these men who instigated the demonstration against him; their idea being to get him out of the way. Colonel Ainsworth has had nothing to do with the improvements of the Old Ford's Theater building.

Unfermented Wine at Communion Service.
 Because they believed that the fermented wine was an occasion of stumbling to some who are members of the church, it was decided at the Second Presbyterian church on last Sunday morning, by a vote of 76 to 18, that in the future unfermented wine should be used in celebrating the Lord's Supper. The reason for this action was that the session of the church decided to ask for an expression from the congregation, as there was a division of sentiment with them, and it was thought best to have the voice of the people before passing finally on the question. The congregational vote was taken without any discussion, and simply as an expression of opinion, and the congregational action was ratified by the session of the church directly the congregation adjourned.—*Staunton Vindicator.*
